



You may have held one of these positions last fraternal year and want a new challenge for this upcoming year.

To assist the State Deputy, Grand Knights are requested to reproduce and distribute this interest survey to all interested Knights in their Council.

Completed submissions provide the State Deputy with a pool of interested and capable candidates to fill the appointments. This however, does not in any way limit his choices for those appointments to those who have expressed an interest.



STATE DEPUTY REPORT

April 24,2016

Your Excellency, Bishop Etienne, Reverend Fathers, Worthy Supreme Director Kenneth Stockwell, Worthy Supreme Representative, MPC Patrick Maloney, Worthy State Officers, Past State Deputies, District Deputies, Convention Delegates, Brother Knights, Wives and guests.

Peggy and I are so pleased to have had the honor and privilege to have served this year as the leader of the Wyoming Knights of Columbus. Thank you. The year started off June 4th with the State Deputy-elect training in New Haven, CT for the Jurisdictional State Deputies from around the world. With the recent layoffs in the energy sector and expected continuing loss of those types of job and the ripple (more like a tidal wave) down effect it will have on the Wyoming economy, the budget committee anticipates a 20% reduction in membership and in income for the 16-17 fraternal year, reducing our non-pass through income from 35.5K to 28.5

Expenses next year would remain at the current spending of 38.5 with 10K being pulled from the General reserve fund that has approx. 75K

This is a unique year as the job losses may be just a start and a new Presidents policy may reverse this trend. There for it is this committee's recommendation that the state officers review the current budget and plan for either a raise in revenue, spending cuts, or continuing of taking out money from our savings.

Please note the required process for delegate approval of Resolutions per the Supreme Secretary and Roberts Rules of Order:

Recommendations:

The Committee shall present all the resolutions to the State Council together with its recommendations.

As to each resolution, the Committee should offer one of the following recommendations:

- a) Adopt;
- b) Reject;
- c) No Action; or
- d) Refer to Executive Committee.

A recommendation of "No Action" does not indicate that the resolution is without merit. It indicates only that, in the opinion of the Committee: (a) the proposed resolutions should not be expressed by the

State Council or the Order at this time; (b) the resolution itself requires no specific action; or (c) that the resolution proposes something that is already in effect in the State Council or in the Order.

In addition, the Committee may offer a substitute resolution, which modifies or refines the rationale and/or proposed action of one or more submitted resolutions. The substitute resolution may articulate a more precise or comprehensive statement of the issue or may summarize the substance of multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue. Where multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue have been submitted, the Committee may recommend adopting the one resolution that best expresses the proposal under consideration, and taking no action on all the others.

The recommendations of the Committee should be promulgated in the report submitted by the Chairman of the Committee during the State Council meeting.

The Executive Committee should promptly consider resolutions that have been referred to it. The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, act upon these resolutions or defer action pending further study.

Voting on the resolutions

Robert's Rules of Order provides that a motion presented on behalf of a committee having more than one member does not need a second. Because the Committee consists of more than one member, it is assumed that, if needed, someone on the Committee would second the motion. During the Committee's report at the State Council meeting, the Committee Chairman will announce a recommendation for each resolution that was properly submitted. After this announcement, there will be a brief pause before the gavel is dropped, signifying the end of the discussion period. If no objection is raised during the pause before the drop of the gavel, the assembled body agrees to follow the Committee's recommendation. Ordinarily, only authorized delegates may speak in support of or in opposition to a resolution. The State Council by-laws will identify those members who may serve as delegates.

The Chairman of the meeting will recognize a delegate on the floor as needed. When the delegate is recognized by the Chairman, he shall address the Chairman and give his name, his council number, and his office. He should limit his remarks to the matter under consideration and should speak in a manner befitting a Catholic gentleman. The Chairman of the meeting may, in his discretion and in compliance with State Council bylaws and *Robert's Rules of Order*, invoke a limitation on debate, provided that the same shall apply uniformly to all delegates.

WHEREAS, In 2015, George A. Burns (the owner of the 1st door) wrote the story in his own words:

The Knights of Columbus Traveling Door

This is the story of the beginning of the KofC Traveling Door, as written by George Burns, PSD

The History of the Traveling Door begins in 1960. My Wife (Ann) and I attended the KofC Convention in Laramie that year. We attended the Sat. evening banquet and dance that followed. We were told there would be a door prize awarded to some lucky winner at mid-night. We were all given a lucky ticket for the drawing. We danced and visited with the other Knights and their wives. We had a good time.

At midnight the drawing was held. I don't remember if Ann's ticket or mine was the winner. They brought the door prize out to us. It was a door, how appropriate. We loaded it in the back of our station wagon and took it home the next day.

We had a door, but didn't need a door in our home in Dubois.

Over the next several days, maybe a week, we talked about what to do with the door. Finally, one evening, at the supper table, one of us suggested that we take the door to Riverton, to the next Council meeting, and ask them if we could make this a Traveling Trophy for the KofC's. The suggestion was accepted whole heartedly, and the Traveling Door Trophy was born.

We decided, that since the door came from Laramie, we would make the Laramie Council #2720, the first Council on the door.

We had the door in our possession so we kept it, as we were to host the State Convention the following year, 1961. When we approached the end of the convention, we brought the door to the front of the room, called Casper Council #1563, to the front, presented them with the Door, and then told the delegates the where, how, and why of the Traveling Door. It must have been accepted, as the Traveling Door has been traveling around the great state of Wyoming ever since.

I guess a correction should be made here, as there were a few years when the Door was retired, but that took the fun and stories about the Door out of the proceedings, and the Traveling Door was soon back in action.

I'm hoping the Traveling Door continues to be passed around the State for another 50 years. I'm also hoping this story becomes part of the History and Tradition of the Wyoming State Council, of the Knights of Columbus.

My Wife and I are proud yet humbled to be part of our History.

District Deputy 3 Report to State Officers

Worthy State Deputy John Benedik and fellow State Officers,

This report is concluding my first year as District Deputy 3. My, what a busy and learning year it has been. It has been a very successful year also.

District 3 has 4 councils in the district, 2441- Rock Springs, 6216- Evanston, 7453- Green River, and 10027- Fort Bridger. Three councils in the district have been very active throughout the year. Evanston council is still at a stand still trying to get things moving. This will be discussed latter. I will summarize each council below. Hopefully, this will give you some idea of how the councils are progressing.

Council 2441- Rock Springs

This council has a new Grand Knight. There has been a learning curve for the new GK but he had plenty of experienced help from long time members of the council. They are very involved in support of Pro Life. They had fund raisers for procurement of the Ultrasound machine located in Rock Springs. They also have fund raisers to support the Wyoming Pregnancy Center. They are presently involved in a cross making project where the funds will go toward the priests retirement, St. Joseph's children home and the Wounded Warriors organization. They are involved in all the yearly projects, i.e., RSVP, Coats for Kids, Keep Christ in Christmas, Family of the Month, Scholarships and Boy Scouts support. Their council continues to grow. They had 6 new members and one member passed away for a net gain of 5. The insurance count stayed the same. No new insurance policies. Perhaps this is one area that could be addressed. Their long time Financial Secretary, Jim Borzea, is retiring from the position after this year. He said it has been long enough. He and his wife are going to do some traveling. They have had a problem trying to fill the position. Nobody wanted to take it over. Brad Bettolo finally talked Dwane Pachaco to take the position. Paperwork is being finalized as I write this report. Overall, this council is an experienced, active and up to date council that are in good standing with Supreme. They should apply for the Columbian Award but I don't think they will apply for the Star Council Award.

Council 6261-Evanston

This council has had very little success in rejuvenating their council. The GK is busy taking care of family medical issues up in North Dakota, while the FS has been going to school and living in Ogden, UT. They have been able to keep up on paperwork and finances to State and Supreme offices. They sent out dues which about 1/3 paid. 2nd notices were sent out and they are getting ready to send out notices of intent to suspend. To top everything off, Fr. Tim is being transferred to Newcastle. The Fort Bridger council

was working with them and Fr. Tim during Lent to establish projects to let the people in Evanston know that the council is still active. They were active in 40 cans for 40 days along with Fort Bridger. I still think if we can get officers installed that are not so busy or traveling, or always have excuses why nothing works, we can begin to build up their council with assistance from other councils and the State council. This is one of my goals for this year. Once the new priest arrives, I will be working with him on this project. Fort Bridger council is all in favor of helping them get back on their feet.

Council 7453-Green River

Again, we have a very experienced active council. Sean Sherwin their GK is resigning after this year. He is becoming more involved in the Boy Scouts and can't do both jobs to the extent he would like. I haven't heard if anyone stepped up to take the position yet. The council is busy with their fish fry's and breakfasts. They are quite involved in degree exemplifications along with members from the Rock Springs council. Their council also continues to grow. They have a net gain of 5 members this year to date. Their insurance quotas, like Rock Springs, stayed the same. Again, maybe this is something that we can address. They are involved in the yearly programs set up by Supreme i.e., RSVP, Coats for Kids, Scholarships, Support for the Boy Scouts, Family of the Month and much more. They support many activities both in the church and community. They had a misunderstanding with Supreme on some finances but got that straightened out. They are in good standing with state and supreme at this time with both finances and paperwork. Gene Shaw, their FS, is doing a great job in keeping up with the paperwork. This council should apply for the Columbian Award. I don't think they can qualify for the Star Council Award.

Council 10027-Fort Bridger

This council is becoming more experienced and active all the time. The majority of the members received their 4th degree last year and it has been shot in the arm. Everyone is excited about wearing their tux's on Tuxedo Sunday and wearing their regalia for honor guard. Members are stepping up and volunteering to help out with different projects. Their main fund raiser was weekly bingo, but now they have a Sno-Cone-Cotton Candy booth that makes them more money for their projects. Parking at the church during the Mountain Man Rendezvous has also made some good money for them. They can now participate in more of the yearly programs instituted by Supreme i.e., RSVP, Coats for Kids, Keep Christ in Christmas, Family of the Month and much more. They just became involved with the local Special Olympics organization. They will be helping them out this coming year. Their new GK, Felix Campos, is learning the responsibilities of the position. Meeting procedure has been addressed to make the meeting more responsible and meaningful. They are in good standing with both State and Supreme Councils in both finances and paperwork. This council will apply for the Columbian award but will not qualify for the Star Council Award. Potential candidates are at a minimum right now. Our GK is talking with our Spanish community about joining our council. They weren't too responsive until we started wearing our regalia to special masses. They seem to be a little more interested now. Time will tell.

This is a short summary but hopefully it will update you on how the councils in SW Wyoming are doing. Overall, it appears that the majority of the councils are progressing just fine. I think with a little prodding and help, we can get Evanston up and running.

There is one item of discussion that I would like to bring up. There are two (2) 4th degree assemblies in SW Wyoming. One is in Green River and one is in Rock Springs. The 4th degree members in Fort Bridger are part of the Rock Springs assembly. All of the 4th degrees work together with honor guards and anything else that requires 4th degrees. Why can't we combine the two (2) assemblies? I think that would make for better relations between the members and be more functional overall. Just something to think about.

After much deliberation and reflection on this past year, here is my report on the year.

There is no doubt that the Knights of Columbus in the State of Wyoming do quite a bit of great work helping our churches, parishes, and communities. Ask any Knight and he will brag about the work that his Council does. I don't need to get into that here.

We all brag about our Councils great work.

But where we have difficulty is in the communication of our great activities. How much does one Council know about what is happening in another Council? How is that information disseminated? Is it?

Each Council has its way of sharing information, it's own website, an email list, a telephone chain. But how does that information get from Casper to Thermopolis. Or from Torrington to Powell? Does it?

The State Council last year revised the website. I must confess I have not gone to check it out. The Cheyenne Council, my own council, revised its website as well. Another website I haven't gone to.

I would venture a guess that most members of most Council have not been to the State's website. Brian Dever, I am sure, does a fantastic job with the newsletter. But, if it's posted on the website, who sees it?

I work in a claims office for a major insurance company. I spend all day everyday trying to reach people who were recently involved in automobile collisions. At one time, we could call their home number and the wife would be home and answer the home phone and resolve the claim. Now, we call home and get voice mail. Then we call the cell phone and get voice mail, then we call work and leave another message. We also send text messages and sent emails. And send letters via the US Postal Service. And still, we have difficulty reaching some people.

One size fits all, doesn't work any more. Just as at work, calling home and talking to the wife to resolve a claim doesn't work any more, relying exclusively or heavily on one means of communication does not work any more either.

We need to meet people where they are, communicate with Knights at their speed at their convenience. We need to utilize the technology that is available to use to reach out to each other so that Knights around this State and around the country know what's going on in the Cowboy State. We need to get on Facebook. We need to use Twitter, Instagram, and the other social media that is available to us.

Charitable Trust

Statement of Investment Objectives and Policies January, 1991(Rev. April, 2016)

General

This statement is intended to set forth the factors involved in the management of investment assets for the Wyoming State Knights of Columbus Charitable Trust. The Responsibility of the Knights of Columbus is: to establish broad investment policies, guidelines and objectives for the Trust Estate. The responsibility of the trustee's is to develop and implement management strategies in accordance with the stated investment policies, guidelines and objectives, in a manner consistent with the "prudent man" rule for similar funds, i.e. with care, skill, prudence and diligence, with full discretion subject to the guidelines and applicable statutes. The investment manager is responsible for optimizing return within guideline constraints.

Philosophy

In developing' this investment policy, a Total Portfolio approach to investments has been adopted. The Knights of Columbus recognizes that distinct asset classes have unique return and risk characteristics. Further, it understands that the combination of asset classes produces diversification benefits in the form of enhancement of expected return at a given risk level and/or reduction of the risk level associated with a specific expected return.

In developing this policy, the Knights of Columbus and its Advisers carefully evaluated the long term goals for monies contributed to the Trust. Consideration was given to the Trust's financial requirements, the nature of the liabilities to be discharged and its risk taking capacity. Finally, the Knights of Columbus considered the range of historic and expected returns, both nominal and real.

The Knights of Columbus, therefore, has decided to pursue a strategic investment plan that, over a long term, will:

- 1) enhance the real purchasing power of plan assets and;
- 2) not threaten the plan's ability to meet committed obligations.

Strategic Asset Allocation Plan

The Knights of Columbus has adopted a target asset allocation policy as follows:

	<u>NORM</u>
Domestic Equities	45%
Domestic Bonds	50%
Short Term	5%
	100%

Component Returns and Program Administration

At least semi-annually, the Trustee shall prepare an analysis that reflects the effects of the Trust's objectives and the actual and targeted asset allocation decisions. This analysis shall include recommendations with respect to the targeted percentage allocation, if appropriate.

Significant changes in the relative values of assets or significant shifts in the Trust's asset allocation policy may require actual transfers of assets among asset classes.

Social and Moral Responsibility in Investments

The Knights of Columbus believes that it must conduct its financial affairs in a manner consistent with the social, ethical and moral teachings of the Church. Toward this end, certain investments shall be prohibited.

The specific types of investments to be prohibited shall be subject to regular periodic review by the Knights of Columbus.

In addition, indirect investments in mutual funds or other collective vehicles shall be precluded unless the vehicles are managed in accordance with the same social investment policy.

Performance Measurement

Performance evaluations will be constructed in order to provide a uniform and consistent basis for the evaluation of the Trustees as well as the Trust Estate. The Trust Estate results, as well as those of the Trustee, will be evaluated against several benchmarks. This evaluation also shall examine the individual and

aggregate characteristics of the Trust's investment program to ensure that the Trust Estate is operating in the intended manner.

Evaluations shall be adjusted to reflect the consequences of the Knights of Columbus Social Investment restrictions as appropriate.

Reporting and Communication

Trustees are expected to meet at least semi-annually with the Knights of Columbus and/or its representatives. In addition, the Trustees are expected to periodically report on Portfolio operations, holdings, performance and outlook. Trustees are required to immediately communicate organizational changes, unusual financial market developments, guideline questions and/or personal changes to the Knights of Columbus through its appointed representatives.





2016 Grand Knight's Report for the Wyoming State Council Fr. James F. Power Council #9917, Casper

The Council continues its customary activities in support of the social life of the parish while raising funds for the seminarians of the diocese. RSVP breakfast are held in eight months of the year, September through April, typically on the third Sunday of the month. After a slow start to the breakfasts, we set a new attendance record with more than 200 in December. The council continued its practice of giving each seminarian from the diocese \$500 for Christmas travel. The parish continued to buy and give away RSVP breakfast tickets to CCD teachers, which helped attendance. Our May event is the parish's annual First Communion breakfast, not an RSVP breakfast.

We also cook breakfast in June, but for the TrueCare Pregnancy Resource Center in Casper. The first Saturday of the month TrueCare sponsors a fun walk in North Casper Park. In 2015, we took both our BBQ trailer and pancake grill to the park (the latter supported by a large generator) and served a hot breakfast of sausage and pancakes. Many of the walkers come from Casper's non-Catholic churches and we were happy to be able to serve them.

The Council continued its tradition of a pig roast in July, the parish picnic on the feast of the Assumption and a spaghetti dinner for Columbus Day.

In the fall, St. Anthony Tri-Parish Catholic School holds it annual Joy Breakfast for its donors at the school. Again this year, the school asked the Council to cook the breakfast. In addition, the Council cooked this year for Back to School Night, several retreats held at St. Patrick's Ministry Center for the students, and Track Day in the spring.

When a St. Anthony School donor purchased three ping pong tables for the middle school students, the school discovered that they came very disassembled and that assembly would cost \$300 each. The Council did it on a Saturday morning for a case of beer.

We tried a new event this year, a Coats for Kids project. Knights and youth from the parish solicited coats (or donations) at the East side Wal-Mart on one weekend in October. About 80 coats were donated (or purchased with donations). They were given away at an open house at The Link, a drop-in center operated by Casper Youth for Christ, to needy families screened by CYC. They were delighted to have to Knights partner with them on this project and we expect to do more joint projects for evangelical outreach.

To support the Holy Cross Food Bank, we put together a Thanksgiving dinner with all the trimmings. The Board and volunteers from Holy Cross served the meal, with many of the recipients being Center clients. We also accepted donated hams, turkeys and desserts for a raffle/silent auction. Because the Council's out-of-pocket costs were less than \$30, we were able to donate more than \$2,000 to the Center. Jim Venjohn lined up the food donations.

Our 5th Annual Gun Raffle failed to sell all the tickets but we managed to raise \$40,000 for the St. Joseph Society for Retired Priests. Although we have a couple of months left to draw tickets, we're already selling tickets for our 6th Annual Gun Raffle with hopes of selling all the tickets.

2016 Grand Knight's Report Fr. James F. Power Council #9917

The Grand Knight has met with Fr. Gary and the director of religious education in response to the Supreme Council initiative *Building the Domestic Church While Strengthening Our Parish*. St. Patrick's Parish Council already has in the works its own evaluation of parish ministries. Parish staff and the Council chairman will be presenting their results to the Council at its regular meeting on April 26 to help guide the Council in the initiative.

The Council had its usual summer and Christmas socials, and hopes to add two more to the calendar in the coming year. The Council needs more social activities limited to the Knights and their families. Although enjoyable, picking up the trash on two miles of Interstate 25 doesn't count as a family social activity

The Council will not earn its third successive Star Council award for the fraternal year ending June 30, 2016. It simply could not recruit enough new members to replace the ones that were dropped.

Interstate Billboard Project

Bindl Council 10027, Fort Bridger, WY 82933

This particular project came to fruition in two ways:

- 1. Two existing billboards for the church were deteriorated, broken and one missing. You couldn't read the billboard on the South side of the interstate because the paint was faded and peeling off. You couldn't see the billboard on the North side of the interstate because it was blown down.
- 2. At last years' state convention, there was information and desires to install Pro Life Billboards along Interstates, Highways, and County roads throughout Wyoming. With this in mind, our council thought we could kill two birds with one stone by installing new billboards with the church information on Mass times and also ad Pro Life signs while we were updating the church signs.

We set out investigating what types of Pro Life signs were available and who manufactured them. There was an online company named Phase III Media and Production that manufactured vinyl Pro Life Billboard signs. Westar Printing, a local printing company, manufactured vinyl signs with wording per our specifications. They could make the sign with whatever wording we wanted on it and whatever size we specified.

We decided on the size, wording and pre-designed Pro Life signs. Then we proceeded to repair and prepare the existing

sign that was still upright and build a new 8' x 8' plywood sign to replace the sign that was blown down.

The Highway Department was contacted to verify the proper paperwork and Right of Ways were still in effect and up to date. We received their approval to work in the highway Right of Way while working on the signs.

Vinyl signs were ordered, paid for by the council and installed on the plywood signs using ratchet straps, rope and trim boards.

Overall, there were about 35 hours of labor donated by the council members and 20% of the council was involved in the entire project.

We now have beautiful signs on both the North and South sides of Interstate I-80 that show there is a Catholic church in Fort Bridger, Wyoming and that our Sunday Mass is at 11:00 am. It also shows that we support Pro Life and that Life is a Gift not a choice!!

MONSIGNOR FREDERICK KIMMETT

Compiled by Paul E. Puebla, Grand Knight 2004-2007 Monsignor Frederick J. Kimmett Knights of Columbus Council 6623 Torrington, Wyoming

Monsignor Frederick Kimmett although born in Colorado May 5, 1905, spent his childhood in Powell, Wyoming. In 1924 at age 19 Fred Kimmett became a member of the Knights of Columbus and remained a Knight the last 72 years of his life. He was ordained June 6,1933 by Bishop Patrick. A. McGovern, served as assistant in Casper, and then was assigned to Monarch, Wyoming.

Named to replace Father Spillane in 1936, he returned to his home parish, St. Barbara's in Powell, and its missions of St. Anthony's in Cody and Yellowstone Park, with stations at Meeteetse and Elk Basin.

At a June 10, 1937, meeting, the trustees decided to install plumbing and fixtures in the priest's quarters at the rear of the church because the Cody city council intended to condemn all outside toilets within the city limits.

By July, the trustees had determined that crowded conditions in the church during tourist season required four more pews. In October, they voted to request bids to redecorate and repaint the interior of the church, to purchase a new vestment case, and to install two floor furnaces. However, the local Gas Company recommended using the old furnace as cheaper. The financial statement of St. Anthony's Church at the end of 1937 included receipts of \$1,290.71 and expenditures of \$1,123.63, including \$255.88 to install plumbing.

According to the 1938 census, Powell had fifty-three Catholic families and Cody had forty-five, but those figures did not include the more than 100 Catholic young men in the nearby CCC camp or Mexican families working in the beet fields in summer. On May 15,1938, Bishop - McGovern confirmed fifty-six candidates at Powell, including ten from Cody. According to the new summer schedule in 1938, Mass was offered each Sunday at four points in Yellowstone Park: Old Faithful Lodge, Lake Lodge, Canyon Lodge, and Mammoth chapel. In January 1939, after discussing improvements in the church's heat and ventilation, the trustees agreed to install two windows on each side of the church

By February 27, Father Kimmett reported that Keith Young Plumbing had submitted a plan for a forced-air circulating system which was "guaranteed to give satisfaction for \$300." On January 6, 1940, the trustees learned that the lot and small house adjoining the

church property was for sale and would be an ideal location for a parish rectory if a resident pastor was appointed for the parish. Father Kimmett agreed to consult Bishop McGovern while the trustees investigated the cost of the property. Father Kimmett reported on February 7, that Bishop McGovern had expressed the "need for a residence or at feast a lot for one as near as possible to the church." The trustees appointed a committee "to estimate the cost of and obtain a description of the lots immediately back of the church property."

On March 15, Bishop McGovern authorized the corporation to buy the comer lots for \$2,500, but indicated he preferred the inside lots back of the church. The Bishop declared that he was anxious to send a resident pastor to Cody as soon as he had enough priests. The trustees agreed to buy the corner lots on April 6, and after the purchase on April 26 sent the deed to Bishop McGovern.

St Anthony's Church Becomes a Parish

At a meeting of the trustees on October 27,1940, Father Kimmett read the following statement from Bishop McGovern: "At the request and with the approval of the pastor of Powell, we hereby divide the said parish and create the new parish of Cody," and then spelled out the specific limits of the Powell parish within Park County. The changed status of St Anthony's meant financial records were kept separately from those of St Barbara's, but Father Kimmett continued to serve as temporary pastor until January 16, 1944, with a salary of \$25 a month and a monthly maintenance fee of \$25 to St Barbara's Church. In May 1941, the trustees approved a bid of \$175 for painting the church.

About June 1, 1942 great activity began at a spot some twelve miles west of Powell. Under the supervision of the U.S. Army a city of barracks began to rise. This was to become a Relocation Center for about ten thousand people of Japanese origin who were being forcefully removed from their homes on the West Coast The Japanese-Americans and Japanese-Nationals who were being incarcerated in the Center for the duration of the war began to arrive on September 1, 1942. After several attempts, Father Kimmett finally gained admission to the camp in an effort to seek out those who were Catholic.

He found that mere were a number of very devout Catholic families among the Japanese internees, and on the first Sunday in October held a Rosary service in the camp which was attended by about 100 very grateful Catholics. The people petitioned for the privilege of Sunday Mass. As the pastor was obligated to say Mass in Powell and Cody each Sunday he was unable to grant the request But he promised to say Mass for them on a weekday until provision could be made for Sunday Mass. Father Kimmett wrote to Bishop McGovern about the situation at the Heart Mountain Center and requested that an assistant be sent to Powell to minister to the Japanese. Bishop McGovern made an appeal to the Maryknoll Fathers for help, and on November 1,1942 Father Harold Felsecker, M.M., who had spent ten arduous mission years in Japan, arrived to take charge of the Catholic faithful at Heart Mountain.

On January 9, 1944, St Anthony's Church had a balance of \$1,293.68 in the First National Bank of Powell, total assets of \$2,773.68, with no outstanding debts. At that meeting, Father Kimmett officially notified the trustees that Bishop McGovem had appointed Father Francis T. Penny, pastor of St Anthony's Church. Father Penny took charge of the Cody parish on Sunday, January 16, 1944, resided at St Barbara's in Powell, and served bom parishes as the appointed administrator while Father Kimmett served as chaplain hi the U.S. Army.

January 1, 1944 was \$2,224.68. Investments hi utility and U.S. bonds amounted to \$8,220.00. At the opening of the year Bishop McGovern informed Father Kimmett that he

was in a position to send Father Francis Penny as pastor to Cody. Father Kimmett requested Bishop McGovem for permission to join the Army as a chaplain, leaving Father Penny in Powell during his absence. The request was granted, and Father Kimmett left Powell on Jan. 27 to await his commission in the Army. On April 26, 1946 Father Kimmett completed his active duty as an U. S. Army chaplain and after a few months R&R at St. Joseph Orphanage in Torrington, Wyoming, he returned to resume the duties of pastor of Powell. On the same date Father Penny went to Cody to become resident pastor there.

When Father Kimmett returned to Powell in August 1946, Father Penny was free to live in Cody, but because visiting priests were living at the church, he lived at the Helms residence until September and then moved into the priest's apartment to save for a future parish plant.

On Sept. 13, 1948, Bishop McGovem announced that Father Kimmett, who had served as pastor of Powell for twelve years, was to be transferred to Sheridan as pastor of the parish there. Father Kimmett's successor was to be the Father Daniel Carroll, pastor at Pine Bluffs. The transfer of pastors was to be effective October 15,1948.

Through the wishes and efforts of Father Fred Kimmett, the Knights of Columbus Council 3043 was organized in St. Barbara's Parish on April 27, 1947. The first Grand Knight, was John Kopriva.

Father George Stoll, assistant in the parish at the time of Father Short's death, served as administrator of the parish until the arrival of Father Kimmett as pastor on October 15, 1948.

Soon after taking charge of the parish, Father Kimmett realized there was a pressing need of a parish hall for parish activities. The only accommodation for all parish meetings and activities was a small room in the basement of the school. After consulting with Bishop Newell about the parish hall, Father Kimmett appointed a building committee to assist in the development of a building program. James Goar and William D. Redle headed this committee. After an estimate of the approximate cost of the proposed parish hall it was decided to entrust the management of a campaign to raise funds for the new building to the American City Bureau of Chicago.

This campaign was started June 1, 1949, and completed about six weeks later. The goal was set at \$125,000. At the completion of the campaign it was found that \$136,000 had been pledged to the new building. At the conclusion of the successful drive for funds, the architectural firm of Cook and Whitney was contracted to draw plans for the new building. In the process of drawing the plans, the building committee realized that the new building should include four classrooms to accommodate an increase in enrollment in the parish school. When the plans were finally approved they called for a combination auditorium and gymnasium, four classrooms, cafeteria, kitchen, library and two meeting rooms. On July 5, 1950, contracts were let for the construction of the new building at a cost of \$185,948.51.

Priests who served as assistants in the parish during the ten year period of 1940 to 1950 are as follows: Father Terence McGovem, January 14, 1944; Father Herbert Kraus, July 6,1944; Father Thomas Deary, November 15,1946; Father George Stoll, February 10,1948; Father Thomas Fahey, June 15,1949.

Confirmation was administered in the parish on three occasions during the ten-year period. On May 25,1941, the Bishop Patrick A. McGovem, DD, confirmed a class of ninety-nine. On September 9, 1945, a class of ninety-two was confirmed by Bishop McGovem. Bishop Hubert M. Newell, DD confirmed a class of one hundred eight on October 16,1949.

The following statistics taken from the annual reports reveal the growth of the parish from 1940 to 1950. The records for 1940 list 275 Catholic families in the parish, 36 baptisms, 14 marriages and 24 First Communions. The report for 1950 lists 410 Catholic families, 88 baptisms, 20 marriages and 60 First Communions.

In spring of 1959, Father Kimmett, who was pastor during this period of spiritual and temporal growth, made plans for yet another building. This was to be an adequate home for the Sisters of Charity of Leavenworth, Kansas, who staffed Holy Name School from its inception. The company of A.G. Link, who had drawn the plans for the rectory, was once more contracted to initiate the work on the convent. During the course of this work, Father Kimmett was transferred to St. Mary's Cathedral. During this decade of growth at Holy Name Parish, Father Kimmett had the valuable assistance of Reverend Thomas Fahey till September 1952, when Father Joseph Fraher took over till July 1955. Father Jerome Logue succeeded Father Fraher, Father Logue remained until July of 1957 when Father Philip Colibraro took his place.

On May 22, 1959 Bishop Newell announced the appointment of Father Frederic J. Kimmett as Rector of St. Mary's Cathedral to succeed Monsignor Hartmann. Bishop Newell officiated at the formal installation of Very Reverend F. J. Kimmett as Rector of the Cathedral on September 13,1959.

Hundreds of parishioners and friends gathered in St. Mary's Cathedral on the afternoon of June 14,1959 to pay a well deserved tribute to Monsignor James A. Hartmann who had served as the devoted pastor of the parish for forty-four years. The Right Reverend Monsignor Thomas O'Reilly paid an eloquent tribute to Monsignor Hartmann and his accomplishments.

Only two Pastors served St Mary's during the 1%0's. Frederick J. Kimmett served as Pastor from 1960 through 1963. He served the parish during its building program that saw the renovation of the Cathedral and the construction of the modern new St. Mary's School Gymnasium. In September of 1964 he resigned as Pastor of St. Mary's Parish because of failing health and took over the less demanding duties of Pastor at St. Louis Church in Glenrock.

During Monsignor Kimmett's tenure at St. Louis Church in Glenrock, the sacristy was enlarged and rooms to teach religion classes were made over from an apartment in back of the church. The Church also received a complete paint and cleaning job at this time. Monsignor Kimmett served as pastor for only one and a half years then was transferred in July 1966 to St. Edmund's parish in Ranchester, Wyo.

February 16, 1960 Bishop Hubert M. Newell dedicated the student chapel in St. Mary's high school in Cheyenne, assisted by the Very Reverend Frederick J. Kimmett, pastor, and Father Jerome Logue. The chapel was built at a cost of \$4,500, which was raised entirely by voluntary contributions.

On Sept. 1966, Monsignor Frederick Kimmett came to St. Edmund's as new Pastor. On Oct.9, 1966, the installation for Monsignor was held and a dinner was given at the Ranchester Hall However, his stay was very short in this parish. He was transferred to Corpus Christi Parish in Newcastle in Sept. 1967.

The Right Reverend F. J. Kimmett became pastor on the 12th of January 1968, and in April \$4,000.00 plus \$160.00 interest was paid to St. Joseph's Orphanage. In July the furnaces of both church and rectory were converted from oil burners to gas and the outside trim on the church was painted. Repair of the heating system was necessary in January 1969, and new kneelers were installed-a joy to old bones! A year later the heating system was converted from to hot water at an approximate cost of \$4500.00. In August two new trustees, Carl Hinz and Ben Sikes, were elected and in January 1970 Father Cletus Prado, replaced Monsignor Kimmett.

September 27, 1968 -The Wyoming Catholic Register published a special 24-page

color Centennial edition in honor of the founding of the Catholic Church in Cheyenne. Priests serving the parish at the time of the Centenary celebration were Father James O'Neill, pastor, assisted by Father John Wright and Father Patrick Trujillo.

A Concelebrated Pontifical Mass was offered in St. Mary's Cathedral by Archbishop Urban J. Vehr of Denver; Archbishop James V. Casey, Denver; Bishop Joseph L. Federal, Salt Lake; Bishop Charles A. Buswell, Pueblo; Bishop David M. Maloney, Wichita; Bishop Hubert M. Newell; Monsignor James A. Hartmann, Monsignor Frederick J. Kimmett; and Father James O'Neill. Archbishop Casey delivered the homily.

September 1970 Father Leonard Wren retired from St. Patrick's in Wheatland, Wyoming and on September 6 Monsignor Fred J. Kimmett was installed as the new Pastor of St. Patrick's.

Father Leonard Wren retired from St. Patrick's in Wheatland, Wyoming and on September 6 Monsignor Fred J. Kimmett retired as Pastor from St. Patrick's Church on June 5, 1978, and moved to St. Joseph's Children's home in Torrington, Wyoming.

Throughout his retirement Monsignor Kimmett made the rounds to many parishes, when needed, conducting priestly activities and administering the Sacraments. From 1990 through 1992 he left retirement to be the assistant pastor at Trinity Catholic Church in Cheyenne. Finally, at 87 years of age, Monsignor Kimmett retired to the Little Sisters of the Poor Manor in 1993.

Monsignor Frederick Kimmett died April 4, 1996, the at the Little Sisters of the Poor Manor in Denver; Bishop Hart officiated at his funeral in St. Mary's Cathedral, Cheyenne, on April 11 and is buried at Mount Olivet cemetery in Cheyenne, Wyoming in the Priest's circle. Monsignor Fred J. Kimmett was just thirty days short of his 91st birthday.

In my mind's eye I can still see a young Army Chaplain walking into St Joseph's Orphanage in the spring of 1946. He stayed until late August and during that brief period he took us on picnics under the Grandpa tree and acted as lifeguard at the old mud hole where we spent many happy summer afternoons swimming. All the boys and girls loved this young soldier priest, our mentor, who had served his country during World War II. He went on to become an outstanding Parish Priest who performed at his very best to be a pastor till the very end.


