Please note the required process for delegate approval of Resolutions per the Supreme Secretary and Roberts Rules of Order:

Recommendations

The Committee shall present all the resolutions to the State Council together with its recommendations.

As to each resolution, the Committee should offer one of the following recommendations:

- a) Adopt;
- b) Reject;
- c) No Action; or
- d) Refer to Executive Committee.

A recommendation of "No Action" does not indicate that the resolution is without merit. It indicates only that, in the opinion of the Committee: (a) the proposed resolutions should not be expressed by the State Council or the Order at this time; (b) the resolution itself requires no specific action; or (c) that the resolution proposes something that is already in effect in the State Council or in the Order.

In addition, the Committee may offer a substitute resolution, which modifies or refines the rationale and/or proposed action of one or more submitted resolutions. The substitute resolution may articulate a more precise or comprehensive statement of the issue or may summarize the substance of multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue. Where multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue have been submitted, the Committee may recommend adopting the one resolution that best expresses the proposal under consideration, and taking no action on all the others.

The recommendations of the Committee should be promulgated in the report submitted by the Chairman of the Committee during the State Council meeting.

The Executive Committee should promptly consider resolutions that have been referred to it. The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, act upon these resolutions or defer action pending further study.

Voting on the resolutions

Robert's Rules of Order provides that a motion presented on behalf of a committee having more than one member does not need a second. Because the Committee consists of more than one member, it is assumed that, if needed, someone on the Committee would second the motion.

During the Committee's report at the State Council meeting, the Committee Chairman will announce a recommendation for each resolution that was properly submitted. After this announcement, there will be a brief pause before the gavel is dropped, signifying the end of the discussion period. If no objection is raised during the pause before the drop of the gavel, the assembled body agrees to follow the Committee's recommendation. Ordinarily, only authorized delegates may speak in support of or in opposition to a resolution. The State Council by-laws will identify those members who may serve as delegates.

The Chairman of the meeting will recognize a delegate on the floor as needed. When the delegate is recognized by the Chairman, he shall address the Chairman and give his name, his council number, and his office. He should limit his remarks to the matter under consideration and should speak in a manner befitting a Catholic gentleman. The Chairman of the meeting may, in his discretion and in compliance with State Council by-laws and *Robert's Rules of Order*, invoke a limitation on debate, provided that the same shall apply uniformly to all delegates.



Dear Brother Knights of Columbus.

I stand before you to report on State Council activities for the last fiscal year. From going to Supreme Conventions, Supreme summer and winter meetings, the endless webinars and conferences calls for the new faith in action programs, on-line membership, state and council compliance guidelines for safe environment. Even newer still, the Delta church drive initiatives, and council development of landing pages. We are in the closing days of the old regalia to the new uniforms. The closing down of home associations. We were given a new Regional Growth Director, Brother Robert Kish, he replaces what was known as our MPC. Bob is a good guy, and a good Knights of Columbus. Give him your kind consideration and prayers as he has lots of responsibilities. The suspension/retention procedure is something all councils need to be educated on and follow. This is easy to follow, and will make life better for all. The four area of program awards, Faith – Family – Community – Life, is down from the six we had. As a State Council we started a Priest of the Year Award. With a lot of prayer, I think Supreme should follow course. The Wyoming jurisdiction is ready. Here is a summary report for the 4 councils in District 3.

Council 2441-Rock Springs

District 5 Activity Report for 2019

Cody Council

Cody is a very active council, the right arm of Fr. Clark's for St. Anthony's. Their main money raise is the Buffalo Bill Ball in the spring. They generate about \$14000 in this endeavor. They also have pancake breakfasts and ask for donations at other activities. They have a really good program to help support Council. They have a supper before their council meeting. The major program they support is the Sacred Heart Home School program utilizing the Parish school facilities. I attended their supper they provided for the children last year, fun. They also support Serenity the Pregnancy Center in Cody and Powell.

Powell is the other very active council in area 5. It is the right arm of Fr. Wagner at St. Barbara's. They have also found out as have our other councils that some of the old methods for money generating have not been effective as in the past. Their main money raiser is their Pony Races. They have this at the Fair Grounds. They divide the Parish youth by age and size in to groups of 4. Attendees bid on each contestant. The proceeds are split with the Council and the winning bidder. They have a local food vender serve food and beverage and share proceeds. The Races generate about \$6000. Their Scholarship for high school graduates for 4 graduates is the program they support. They do have other programs like pancake suppers for support.

Greybull/Lovell is the challenge in my Dist. They currently have a new Priest in Fr. Glen for Greybull and Lovell. I have been working with them for almost a year now. You can tell that they have had difficulty in understanding you build a council through a strong Fraternity with other Knights. They have only 3 to 4 Knights attend their meetings. Their money raising projects now are Bingo and Gun Raffle. When I began work with them they only supported the Food For Family program for the Community. They now have a Votive Candle stand they support and have financed the replacement of the sidewalk on the south of their property.

The Worland council is a growing council and has a very supportive attendance. Starting 5 years ago they started having a treat after their meeting. Their meetings were lasting about 1.5 hours because Fr. Ray had a dissertation lasting about 20 minutes at every Council meeting. This continues but Fr. has compressed it down and meeting now last one hour. There are now about 10 to 12 attending. Their money raising efforts were two Bingo nights, one in the fall and spring. Due to our support of groups we have been losing funds. They have now added a gun raffle and are developing a budget to help match their funds with expenses. They support a high school graduate, seminarian and their 8th through 12th grade CCD program. They do the actual instruction of the students and provide 6 of the dinner meals during the school year.

2018-2019 Grand Knight's Report

Bishop Patrick A. McGovern Council 801
Cheyenne, Wyoming

The Council's Business Meetings were conducted on each of the 2nd Tuesdays of the month. Each was preceded with a Rosary. Family Potluck Socials were held on each of the 3rd Tuesdays of the month. Officers and Program Directors met on each Thursday prior to the monthly Business Meeting.

Ultra-sound Initiative — Last year with Supreme's program, we raised \$15,000 toward the purchase of a mobile ultra-sound machine for Life Choice Pregnancy Care Center's new mobile van which serves Southeast Wyoming. We exceeded the matching amount (\$15,000) to achieve a total of \$18,000. The additional \$3,000 was donated in August toward installation, training, and maintenance costs.

Council 801 again had their Annual Family Campout in August at Curt Gowdy State Park. Highlights over the 3 days included breakfasts, a milk can dinner, a steak dinner, Mass, shared fellowship, and outdoor recreation.

We participated in the Marian Icon Prayer Program in December and February when we received the 18th Marian Icon, Our Lady of Persecuted Christians, sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. The icon was displayed at all three parish churches and prayer services were conducted at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Joseph Catholic Church. Prayer cards and brochures were distributed. Well over 2,000 people were able to view the icon during its stay in Cheyenne.

We collected 2,089 lbs. of food for St. Joseph's Food Pantry during two drives conducted prior to Thanksgiving and during Lent. We also donated \$200 in cash. Several Knights are regular volunteers at the Pantry where food is distributed four days of each week.

We supported four parish Round Tables: St. Mary's, Holy Trinity, St. Joseph's, and Holy Family (F.E. Warren AFB), with monetary contributions and labor for various projects including parish breakfasts and coffee & donuts.

We held 50 Bingo fundraising events yielding about \$27,000 that was used for charitable purposes.

We held six fish dinners during Lent with proceeds going to charity. This year we designated specific charities for each of the meals which resulted in increased attendance and amount of individual donations. The charities that benefitted from the meals were:

- Cheyenne Knights of Columbus Scholarship Fund (\$710).
- Youth Programs at St Mary, Holy Trinity, and St Joseph Catholic Churches (\$280 each).
- LifeChoice Pregnancy Care Center (\$880).
- Special Olympics of Wyoming (\$491).
- Habitat for Humanity of Laramie County (\$847).
- Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee Relief Fund (\$802).

We held several other fundraising meal events during the year for specific charitable efforts.

Some of the programs and charities that benefit from our fundraising efforts were RSVP, Holy Trinity Building Fund and parking lot expansion, Magic City Enterprises (for people with intellectual and physical disabilities), Special Olympics, St Mary's Catholic School, and college scholarships for high school seniors.

We provided a float for the Cheyenne Christmas parade which included a Nativity display and a "Keep Christ in Christmas" banner.

We held a Christmas Party, and Easter Egg Hunt for children of the parishes and community.

There were numerous "Helping Hands" projects that saw Knights from Council 801 aid the needy members of our parishes and community. Several included assistance in moving and/or disposing of household items and repair of structures. Notable was the installation of a handicap ramp for a parishioner with MS.

We assisted the Mall of St. Vincent DePaul, administered by the Cathedral of St. Mary, in the acquisition and distribution of gently used items.

Many of our Knights participated in the Fall and Spring (Lent) 40 Days for Life prayer vigil at the Planned Parenthood (sic) facility in Fort Collins, CO.

Many of our Knights participated in the Wyoming State March for Life in Cheyenne in February and our assembly provided an Honor Guard. We served a Chili Lunch for participants afterward.

This year we subsidized the purchase of "Bishop Patrick A. McGovern Council 801" polo shirts for our members.

We have been active with many church and civic activities including Highway Clean Up and delivering community Christmas Baskets for Noel's Christmas Giving. Our Knights have volunteered time doing projects for the church and Parish Center including general maintenance of the properties. Council 7453's main mission in the past fraternal year was to get Immaculate Conception parish involved as a parish family, to continue to support our Priest and to participate in parish events/activities/programs.

Council 7453 participate in many activities as part of the "Faith In Action" program within the Knights of Columbus. I have summarized some of activities related to Faith, Community, Family and Life.



Highlights for Council 9756-Knights of Columbus- Pinedale,Wyoming for 2018

Our council was reasonably active for the entire year by providing for several Our Lady of Peace events and also for providing services to the community. Our council supplied food and beverages for the Pinedale Winter Festival, our annual parish picnic, the lunch following the DeSmet Mass and for the Mother's Day brunch. Knights provided support to the Pinedale Catholic Women's group at their largest function on St. Patrick's Day.

Up until recently, our council took up a collection for our assigned seminarian which was close to \$100.00 in donations at each meeting. We have a monthly meeting and our attendance has grown from an average of 8-10 in past years to 18-22 presently.

Our Knights have also performed snow shoveling duties for some elderly, home repairs and visitations to the sick and bereaved. Knights also provided a color guard at the funeral for one of our life long parishioners who passed away recently.

Our council's largest contribution to Our Lady of Peace parish began early in 2018 with demolition of our thrift shop and two attached garages for the start of our church restoration project. Multiple trips to the dump with discards, transferring of church and kitchen supplies to storage, and hours of altering meal preparations for church groups, meetings and planning schedules for upcoming events has kept the council busy.

Bindl Council 10027 currently has 28 members and is in good standing. Unfortunately we have been unable to reach new membership and new insurance quotas. However, the council is vibrant in church, community and fraternal actions.

Our regular monthly meetings are scheduled for the third Sunday of each month. These meetings are frequently attended by about half of the total membership. Our primary fundraising is done through weekly bingo, which we co-sponsor with American Legion Post 36. We also sell cotton candy and snow cones, co-sponsoring with a veteran appreciation group on Independence Day on a day set aside in August.

Our church involvement includes providing ushers for church services, providing support for our priest(s), providing honor guards for member funerals and whenever requested by the pastor, particularly Christmas, Easter, First Communion and Confirmations. We provide maintenance to the church building and grounds, including a great amount of snow removal this winter. We also provide monetary assistance to parish members in need.

We are also actively involved in Parish Council and CCW events held during Labor Day weekend, where breakfast is served on four mornings, and around St. Patrick's Day, where a smorgasbord and auction are held.

Community involvement has included Coats for Kids, where we buy and donate two cases of coats to a Sub-for-Santa program. We light a 60 foot tree in front of the church during Christmas season, which locals always enjoy. This past Thanksgiving Day, we prepared a free dinner for those in need or those who had

no place to go or had no one to be with. We will do it again this year. We sponsor a '40 cans for 40 days' drive during Lent to donate to a local foodbank. We also support the food bank throughout the year.

Our fraternal contributions include assisting other councils with exemplifications and honor guards. We also help other Knights who have needs, particularly in construction projects. We are providing a subsidy for new 4th degree uniforms to those who had purchased the old uniforms. We also sponsor a holiday dinner for Council Knights and their spouses or partners.

It is the recommendation of the Audit Committee to Approve the Wyoming State Council, Knights of Columbus Financial Report of June 30, 2018 AS Written.

During the Audit the Following Observations, Corrections and Recommendations were Noted:

Recommendation: Due to the Small Number of persons in the organization, and the Small Number of persons performing most of the accounting and Financial duties, Adequate Segregation of duties is missing. It is recommended that the Council Implement a system where duties are split between multiple persons. It is the Opinion of the Audit Committee that because we are a small organization it is Impractical to spread the duties among multiple persons.

Observation: Analytic review of revenue and expenses by comparing current year to prior year noted variances due to differences in how current treasurer classifies items compared to how previous treasurers classified items.

It is the opinion of the Audit Committee that standardization will be handled through the implementation of Quickbooks and review of categories for Income and Expenditures.

This year I feel I fell short in getting more councils to participate. There is opportunities for smaller councils to combine orders together since there is a minimum of cases to be ordered to qualify for free shipping.

I'm sure each community has people with intellectual disabilities that will be able to benefit from this program. Using Gillette as an example, we would contact grocery stores as well as other community businesses to hand out Tootsie Rolls from their establishments, explaining what this program does for the community for their donation. We also had members contact businesses to ask for their assistance in supporting this great program.

If I remain chairman, I would like to share with other councils ideas to get their involvement.



You can make this a convention that you won't forget by your participation in the upcoming workshops and other activities at this convention.



To: Worthy State Council (State Convention Casper April 2019)

The change to the new uniform has been progressing in a positive manner and will be the only approved uniform for Color Corps after June 30, 2019. I thank the assemblies in the Wyoming District for the respectful way they have handled the change. I know this has been a difficult transition for many, but I hope that you will continue in your work for the 4th degree, even if you don't participate in Color Corps. I do ask all with the new uniform to become familiar with the protocols for wearing the uniform, especially the beret.

Once again, I thank councils, assemblies and individuals who have donated so generously to the 4th degree. With those funds I have been able to conduct an exemplification in Lander and Cheyenne, bringing in 27 new Sir Knights. It is my plan to hold a minimum of two exemplifications per year—one in the Spring and one in the Fall. To make that happen I would like to have a minimum of 10 candidates, and a host Assembly that will be willing to put in considerable work to host the ceremonial. I will consider additional exemplifications if circumstances warrant that in can viably be done.

Three reports are critical to the maintenance of an Assembly's non-profit status - Report of Current Officers, Annual Audit, and Survey of Fraternal Activity which is now adapted to a new form and very easy to submit on the KofC website. I am urging all assemblies transition as much as possible to the electronic submission via the website. That, like the new uniform, is a difficult transition for some, but provides a profoundly more efficient way to operate. I thank all those in leadership who have responded with forms, and communications. It does make the operation much smoother. Please visit the KofC website and State Council website frequently. There is an abundance of training opportunities on those sites, and well worth the effort and time to take.

Exemplifications and donations are the only funding sources for the fourth degree, and that fund nets about \$25.00 of the \$70.00 collected from each candidate (We do not charge priests). So, I again am requesting donations to build up the 4th degree account. I no longer have the need for purchasing a lot of equipment, that has been taken care of. However, the account is always in need of funds to support travel expenses for teams, and visitations. I have changed

the expense protocol to a per diem and mileage format; I pay \$.30 per mile both ways, and \$65 per diem if an overnight stay is needed. However, I am limiting the number of vehicles that I pay expenses for, by utilizing volunteers in assemblies to fill in for needed team roles. I am considering other alternatives to provide, such as the possibility of doing all of the exemplifications in one or two fairly central venues. I am seeking input from all Sir Knights as to how they would suggest the best way to schedule and provide exemplifications. It does take a lot of planning and about 3 weeks to prepare for and exemplification. All input will be considered.

I have many plans to try to grow the 4th degree, by being more available, and bringing the exemplifications to more areas, but that is much dependent on the recruitment within your councils and assemblies, and the money available in the budget to provide them. Thank you for your time and cooperation in supporting the 4th Degree in Wyoming.

The charitable trust is holding its own. We need to educate all of our newer members on what the Wyoming Charitable Trust is about. This past year our donations were approximately \$18,000 from my letter requesting donations. I sent out 2,464 letters and received donations back from only 85 members. The trust depends on the income from the trust investments and the donations to pay for the premiums on the policies we own. Right now, we have 39 policies and expend approximately \$28,363 a year. This next year we are going to be given another fairly large policy with a premium of about \$6,000 a year. We need to come up with some ideas for raising the insurance monies in the trust.

This past year I was able to get the 990 for the Charitable Trust completed and sent into the IRS.

Worthy Grand Knight and Brother Knights;

I am writing to you in regards to the Wyoming Knights of Columbus Charitable Trust. In 1991, at the State Convention, the Charitable Trust was passed by the delegation and became effective on May 22, 1991.

The original goal was to raise \$1,000,000 for the insurance side of the trust. It was then decided that the general membership should raise the first \$300,000 prior to going to the general public. We made this goal several years ago, but have not gone out to the general public.

With this letter I am asking three things from your council:

1. Please send me a list of businesses including name, address, city, and zip code that are not owned by Knights of Columbus members so that I may send them a letter requesting a donation for the Trust.
2. Please send me a list of names, addresses, city, and zip code of catholic members that I can send a letter requesting a donation. These should be influential members of the catholic community.
3. Please consider doing a fund raiser to help build the corpus for the Trust. I would ask if you would consider doing this for at least three years.

If we could raise our corpus on the insurance side of the Trust to \$500,000 to \$600,00 or more, we could probably eliminate the annual donation request. Or we could continue until we reached our \$1,000,000 goal. We have a serious need for more funds to help pay for premiums for insurance policies that have been donated to the Trust.






