WYOMING STATE TREASURER REPORT 2015

The beginning of our fiscal year 2014-2015 we, as a state council agreed to change our accounting to Quick Books. With the Quick Books format we should be able to see exactly what funds came in for what, and what was spent in each. Therefore, we should have a very good budget to work from. We still use Excel speadsheets for a couple of items.

In July of 2014 the state officers met with our new accountants. Grooms and Harkins, P.C. certified public accountants, in Casper WY. They will file our 990's with the IRS. They will do a review of our books, instead of a full audit, which is sent to Supreme.

In October I closed our general fund checking account and opened a new one. As you may recall at our 2014 convention, I explained that Hilltop National Bank, the old accountants, and I, after going back four-five years in the account could not find the error(s) which caused an imbalance in the account. The difference was to our favor. We all thought it was from checks not being cashed, or deposits not recorded in the checking account. Both the general fund and the tootsie roll accounts have balanced since the change. Going forward all checks will not be honered after six months from issue. Per bank regulations.

To help lighten the work load of the State Deputy, Supreme asked the state officers to follow up with two District Deputies as to any progress or concerns they may have with their councils. District Deputy # one Brother

Doug Gasseling, and District Deputy # two Brother Bret Ladenburger both worked with their councils goals, programs, and membership. We agreed that all of these are connected. They agreed the need to continue with the follow up to their council goals.

I want to give a sincere thank you to our State Secretary Brother John Benedik, and our immediate Past State Deputy Brother Don Scott, for their guidance and knowledge in helping me through these last two years as your State Treasurer. May God Bless both of you.







Please note the required process for delegate approval of Resolutions per the Supreme Secretary and Roberts Rules of Order:

Recommendations

The Committee shall present all the resolutions to the State Council together with its recommendations.

As to each resolution, the Committee should offer one of the following recommendations:

- a) Adopt;
- b) Reject;
- c) No Action; or
- d) Refer to Executive Committee.

A recommendation of "No Action" does not indicate that the resolution is without merit. It indicates only that, in the opinion of the Committee: (a) the proposed resolutions should not be expressed by the

State Council or the Order at this time; (b) the resolution itself requires no specific action; or (c) that the resolution proposes something that is already in effect in the State Council or in the Order.

In addition, the Committee may offer a substitute resolution, which modifies or refines the rationale and/or proposed action of one or more submitted resolutions. The substitute resolution may articulate a more precise or comprehensive statement of the issue or may summarize the substance of multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue. Where multiple resolutions pertaining to the same issue have been submitted, the Committee may recommend adopting the one resolution that best expresses the proposal under consideration, and taking no action on all the others.

The recommendations of the Committee should be promulgated in the report submitted by the Chairman of the Committee during the State Council meeting.

The Executive Committee should promptly consider resolutions that have been referred to it. The Executive Committee may, in its discretion, act upon these resolutions or defer action pending further study.

Voting on the resolutions

Robert's Rules of Order provides that a motion presented on behalf of a committee having more than one member does not need a second. Because the Committee consists of more than one member, it is assumed that, if needed, someone on the Committee would second the motion.

During the Committee's report at the State Council meeting, the Committee Chairman will announce a recommendation for each resolution that was properly submitted. After this announcement, there will be a brief pause before the gavel is dropped, signifying the end of the discussion period. If no objection is raised during the pause before the drop of the gavel, the assembled body agrees to follow the Committee's recommendation. Ordinarily, only authorized delegates may speak in support of or in opposition to a resolution. The State Council by-laws will identify those members who may serve as delegates.

The Chairman of the meeting will recognize a delegate on the floor as needed. When the delegate is recognized by the Chairman, he shall address the Chairman and give his name, his council number, and his office. He should limit his remarks to the matter under consideration and should speak in a manner befitting a Catholic gentleman. The Chairman of the meeting may, in his discretion and in compliance with State Council bylaws and *Robert's Rules of Order*, invoke a limitation on debate, provided that the same shall apply uniformly to all delegates.

This is the story of the beginning of the KofC Traveling Door, as written by George Burns, PSD

The History of the Traveling Door begins in 1960. My Wife (Ann) and I attended the KofC Convention in Laramie that year. We attended the Sat. evening banquet and dance that followed. We were told there would be a door prize awarded to some lucky winner at mid-night. We were all given a lucky ticket for the drawing. We danced and visited with the other Knights and their wives. We had a good time.

At midnight the drawing was held. I don't remember if Ann's ticket or mine was the winner. They brought the door prize out to us. It was a door, how appropriate. We loaded it in the back of our station wagon and took it home the next day.

We had a door, but didn't need a door in our home in Dubois.

Over the next several days, maybe a week, we talked about what to do with the door. Finally one evening, at the supper table, one of us suggested that we take the door to Riverton, to the next Council meeting, and ask them if we could make this a Traveling Trophy for the KofC's. The suggestion was accepted whole heartedly, and the Traveling Door Trophy was born.

We decided, that since the door came from Laramie, we would make the Laramie Council #2720, the first Council on the door.

We had the door in our possession so we kept it, as we were to host the State Convention the following year, 1961. When we approached the end of the convention, we brought the door to the front of the room, called Casper Council #1563, to the front, presented them with the Door, and then told the delegates the where, how, and why of the Traveling Door. It must have been accepted, as the Traveling Door has been traveling around the great state of Wyoming ever since.

I guess a correction should be made here, as there were a few years when the Door was retired, but that took the fun and stories about the Door out of the proceedings, and the Traveling Door was soon back in action.

I'm hoping the Traveling Door continues to be passed around the State for another 50 years. I'm also hoping this story becomes part of the History and Tradition of the Wyoming State Council, of the Knights of Columbus.

My Wife and I are proud yet humbled to be part of our History.

Dear Worthy State Deputy Welty:

The following is a summary of Councils in District 3 of the Wyoming State Council of the Knights of Columbus. District 3 has four councils which includes Council 2441 (Rock Springs), Council 6216 (Evanston), Council 7453 (Green River) and Council 10027 (Fort Bridger), all located in Southwestern Wyoming. I have summarized activities, strengths and weaknesses of each council below. District 3 is a fairly active District with the councils' active in church, youth, community and state participation. Many of the council officers have been through the primary offices and are well organized and know the programs put on by the K of C and they know what activities they perform the best. I have enjoyed my time as a District Deputy because the councils are proficient at reporting and don't need to be hounded to get their reports in on time. They know what they do best, who provides the most help and they focus on these programs, activities and fundraising efforts. My focus has been to promote recruitment of new members and to visit each council at least once per quarter or more if possible. District 3 is working towards having a council reach STAR status. Our District has held several small degrees to increase our membership and will continue to do so in the future. Degree work is primarily conducted by Rock Springs, Green River or a combination of the two councils. They work well together and it has been enjoyable being part of the teams from these dedicated councils.

Council 2441 (Rock Springs)

Rock Springs continues to be a very good council with strong leadership from seasoned Knights. They are instrumental in church affairs such as maintenance/repairs to the churches, funding for special church projects, lecturers, acolytes, ushers, gift bearers, etc. They hold a "Tuxedo Sunday" each month with Sir Knights dressed in tuxedos, serving mass, ushering and bearing the gifts. 2441 continues to support the Ultrasound Initiative and the Southwest Wyoming Pregnancy Center. They held church fundraisers and were instrumental in a multiple church dinner to support the center. They also solicited funds through local businesses. Brother James Borzea is on the Board of Directors as a result of his drive and personal time devoted to the Ultrasound Initiative project. His lovely wife Lydia was also instrumental in this endeavor. 2441 assists in providing scholarships for graduating seniors in the Rock Springs High School. They held a gun safe raffle which was distributed throughout the District to raise operating funds for the Council's charitable activities. Rock Springs also participated in the Baby Bottle Campaign, Coats For Kids Program, Family of the Month, Food For Families and sold books for the Priests' Retirement Fund. 2441 also supports the Guadalupe Mass held each December at the Sweetwater County Events Complex by providing help with the scriptures in Spanish and holding an Honor Guard for the mass. Council 2441 supports the local Boy Scout Troop as well. They recently held a Court of Honor for a new Eagle Scout. 2441 has seasoned officers that have also been Directors/Officers of various programs on the State Level. As indicated earlier, 2441 knows what they

do best to raise funds and they stick to those activities that work. They are a good neighbor to my home council 7453 and we work well together with degree work, fundraising efforts, communications, honor guards, etc. Meetings are held twice a month with anywhere from about 10-20 Knights in attendance. One particular weakness which is District-wide is planning. 2441 and the other three councils are working to improve planning such as activities, budgets, degrees and fundraisers.

Council 6261

Council 6216 has difficulty maintaining active members and poor participation over the last several years. They have limited resources in the form of funds, manpower and participation. They are struggling to maintain a viable council but keep moving ahead the best that they can. Meetings are few and far between due to travel and work schedules of the active members. Brother James Borzea and I recently visited with Father Tim and two active council members to get the ball rolling regarding membership. We will help the council as much as we can. We hope to assist the council more from District and State support in the coming months. Their primary strength is seasoned officers and timely and accurate reporting. Weaknesses seem to be recruitment of new members and holding on to current members and getting them to be more active in church, council, youth and community activities.

Council 7453

Council 7453 is also an active council. They participate in Coats for Kids, sold books for the Priests' Retirement Fund, supported relief efforts of local people who helped in Haiti, provide scholarships to essay contest winners from our parish, support the church with labor and funds for repairs, upgrades and monetary assistance, Food for Families, purchased a table for the Loaves and Fishes Soup Kitchen, Easter Egg Hunt, Mothers Day Flowers, Military Chaplains Scholarship Fund, Tuxedo Sundays, I-80 Exit clean-up project, acolytes, gift bearers, ushers, CCD teachers, church picnic, church festival, RCIA sponsors and honor guards as requested. Primary fund raisers include Lenten Friday Fish Frys, Sunday Lenten Breakfasts, food service at Flaming Gorge Days, food service at the Green River "River Festival" and Wild Horse Marathon. The council has seasoned Knights and is working to get new members through action, advertising and personal contacts with potential members. 7453 has brought in several new Knights during the year and is actively assigning them duties to get them involved. The council is working on establishing a good budget to accurately and better manage charitable activities. The council writes a weekly Knights of Columbus News article in the church bulletin to let the parish know what we are doing, what programs we support and to recruit new members. 7453 has been active in supporting other councils such as 9917 (Casper) by advertising the Gun a Week Raffle for the Priests' Retirement Fund and 2441 (Rock Springs) in the Ultrasound Initiative. 7453 has all four degree teams with assistance from our Brother Knights from Council 2441.

Council 10027

Council 10027 is a small council but does a good job. They are very helpful in supporting the church with labor, repairs, maintenance, etc. They are well known in their parish and I believe well respected. Their primary fund raising effort is through Bingo. The big event for the year is their support in the Annual Saint Patrick's day Community Smorgasbord. They also participate in Coats For Kids, food drives, Family of the Month, Priest/Seminarian Support, scholarships for graduating seniors and are instrumental in church activities by hosting breakfasts and dinners. They have seasoned officers who are timely in reporting. They are working on recruiting new members as well.

Thank you Worthy Supreme Director, Worthy State Officers, and Worthy State Chaplain.

One of the most exciting things happening in my District at this time is the possibility of a mobile ultra sound unit and van, to travel the Big Horn Basin and provide ultra sounds and guidance for pregnant women in need. James Bell, a Knight from Cody is spearheading this project. He was very instrumental with getting the ultra sound unit for the Serenity Crises Pregnancy center. We feel a van will service the entire Basin at an affordable cost. James Bell is currently exploring the possibility of Supreme cost sharing on a van an ultra sound unit. All Councils in the District will be involved in this exiting project.

Powell Council is currently 2 short of our membership quota. We are planning another initiation in May and hope to achieve our goal. In Powell we still do our monthly breakfast. In the spring we hold the annual yard cleanup, it brings 12 to 15 Knights and children together to help clean the yards of the elderly. Also we host a Lenten soup suppers on the Fridays of lent. We are still awarding scholarships for college bound students. In the fall we host a Harvest Dinner, and in the spring we have our annual horse race, both events are fun events for all. Cody also has a fun skeet shoot for the Council each year. And they are very active with the Serenity Crisis Pregnancy Center and spearheading the mobile van for the basin.

Worland Council is a very active Council. They have suspended several members this year and are 8 short of their goal. Worland's big fundraiser is bingo which they host twice a year. They have a 2 mile stretch of Highway that they clean as a

Council. Several Knights volunteer to teach CCD for the Parish. And they host a pancake supper during lent. One of their big achievements this last year are starting a radio station in Worland. They broadcast a Catholic radio station, there frequency is 95.3 FM, and I hope everyone driving through Worland has a chance to tune into it.

Greybull Council has met their goal!! They did initiate 4 new members in November. These were Hispanic men and they watched the DVD in Spanish for the initiation. They are currently trying to get the members revitalized and going again. Hopefully in the next year this can be realized.

Worthy State Deputy,

It is my privilege to report that the Manual Michael Davila Funds for Charities has had another successful year. This program has been an undertaking of the Knights of Columbus of Wyoming since 1975 when it was then called the Tootsie Roll Program. This year, 2015, is the 41th year that the Wyoming Knights of Columbus have been giving away for a donation that delightfully chewy piece of chocolate heaven all for a great cause. Think about it, how hard can it be to hand out candy to kids at Mass or the grocery store?

During the calendar year 2014, there were six councils committed to participate in the Manual Michael Davila Funds for Charities by holding a Tootsie Roll Drive. The number is down from last year and of these six only five have reported of which one has not held the drive yet but will next month; the other held a drive but has not turned in the necessary paperwork. The councils that participated and reported include: Gillette, Lander, Sheridan, and Torrington.

Net revenue, which is the total amount raised minus expenses, for calendar year 2014 was \$15,217.99. This is Below 2013 levels of \$17,569.25; but is in line with 2012 (\$15,887.03). Of the \$15,217.99, the state council received 10% (\$1,521.80) for distribution by resolution at this convention.

The money raised in the 2014 Manual Michael Funds for Charities Tootsie Roll Drive in Wyoming benefitted many worthy causes for people with intellectual disabilities including: Special Olympics both local and state, Our Camp, CHAPS, RENEW, DSI, Wyoming Early Childhood Center, and St. Joseph's Children's Home.

During the 15 years since January 2000, the Manual Michael Davila Funds for Charities has raised and gave away \$244,112.57, almost a quarter of a million dollars! To those of you that have participated, I thank you, and the recipients of these dollars also thank you.



Statement of Investment Objectives and Policies January, 1991

General

This statement is intended to set forth the factors involved in the management of investment essets for the Wyoming State Knights of Columbus Charitable Trust. The Responsibility of the Knights of Columbus is: to establish broad investment policies, guidelines and objectives for the Trust Estate. The responsibility of the trustee's is to develope and implement management stragies in accordance with the stated investment policies, guidelines and objectives, in a manner consistent with the "prudent man" rule for similar funds, i.e., with care, skill, prudence and diligence, with full discretion subject to the guidelines and applicable statutes. The investment manager is responsible for optimizing return within guideline constraints.

Philosophy

In developing this investment policy, a Total Portfolio approach to investments has been adopted. The Knights of Columbus recognizes that distinct asset classes have unique return and risk characteristics. Further, it understands that the combination of asset classes produces diversification benefits in the form of enhancement of expected return at a given risk level and/or reduction of the risk level associated with a specific expected return.

In developing this policy, the Knights of Columbus and its Advisers carefully evaluated the long term goals for monies contributed to the Trust. Consideration was given to the Trust's financial requirements, the nature of the liabilities to be discharged and its risk taking capacity. Finally, the Knights of Columbus considered the range of historic and expected returns, both nominal and real.

The Knights of Columbus, therefore, has decided to pursue a strategic investment plan that, over a long term, will:

- enhance the real purchasing power of plan assets and;
- 2) not threaten the plan's ability to meet committed obligations.

Strategic Asset Allocation Plan

The Knights of Columbus has adopted a target asset allocation policy as follows:

Component Returns and Program Administration

At least semi-annually, the Trustee shall prepare an analysis that reflects the effects of the Trust's objectives and the actual and targeted asset allocation decesions. This analysis shall include recommendations with respect to the targeted percentage allocation, if appropriate.

Significant changes in the relative values of assets or significant shifts in the Trust's asset allocation policy may require actual transfers of assets amoung asset classes.

Social and Moral Responsibility in Investments

The Knights of Columbus believes that it must conduct its financial affairs in a manner consistent with the social, ethical and moral teachings of the Church. Toward this end, certain investments shall be prohibited.

The specific types of investments to be prohibited shall be subject to regular periodic review by the Knights of Columbus.

In addition, indirect investments in mutal funds or other collective vehicles shall be precluded unless the vehicles are managed in accordance with the same social investment policy.

Performance Measurement

Performance evaluations will be constructed in order to provide a a uniform and consistent basis for the evaluation of the Trustees as well as the Trust Estate. The Trust Estate results, as well as those of the Trustee, will be evaluated against several benchmarks. This evaluation also shall examine the individual and aggregate characteristics of the Trust's investment program to ensure that the Trust Estate is operating in the intended manner.

Evaluations shall be adjusted to reflect the consequences of the Knights of Columbus Social Investment restrictions as appropriate.

Reporting and Communication

Trustees are expected to meet as least semi-annually with the Knights of Columbus and/or its representatives. In addition, the Trustees are expected to periodically report on Portfolio operations, holdings, performance and outlook. Trustee's are required to immediately communicate organizational changes, unusual financial market developments, guideline questions and/or personal changes to the Knights of Columbus through its appointed representatives.

Do not let this stop you from helping those in need, just remember that you are representing the Knights of Columbus and do not put the organization in jeopardy. Worthy State Deputy,

Participation in the Knights of Columbus "Food for Families" program among councils in Wyoming varies only a little from year to year. However, fluctuations are much more noticeable when tracked month to month. We see most of our efforts concentrated around Thanksgiving and Christmas, when the need tends to be the highest.

Although needs may vary throughout the year, our efforts to collect nonperishable food should be sustained year-round. As in the past, I would encourage councils that have successful annual collection programs to consider holding similar campaigns every 3-4 months.

Those councils that participate at an advanced level may gain an advantage toward earning the Columbian Award, since this single activity is counted as four Family activities for purposes of earning the award. Also, councils should be sure to complete the Food for Families Reimbursement Program form to receive a partial refund and a plaque. For each \$500 or 1,000 pounds of food donated by a council during a fraternal year, the Supreme Council will refund \$100 to the council, up to a maximum of \$500.

The "Food for Families" program continues to be one of the most effective charitable initiatives our organization has ever implemented. This is a program that is scalable and adaptable to any council's local community.

GOALS AND ACTIVITIES 2014-2015

We did accomplish our two year goal of visiting every pro-life pregnancy center in Wyoming. The success rate of the pregnancy centers is reported as 85-90 %. The centers express totally gratitude to Wyoming Knights for the Ultra Sounds and all the support throughout the years. By visiting these centers we were able to understand their individual activities and goals. Through our visits to centers we defined two goals: 1^{st.} to thank the centers for their commitment to life, and, 2nd to maintain an open line of communications between the centers and the Knights. Our visits validated the truth that they are the first line of offense and the last line of defense in the fight for new life. The majority of activities on which we focused were concerned with Supreme Council's Ultra Sound Initiative.

EVENTS AND ACTIVITES 2014-15

- We accomplished our mission goal. We visited the eight of the nine centers located in Wyoming: Sheridan, Cody, Riverton, Rock Springs, Cheyenne, Casper, Jackson, Laramie, and we anticipate seeing the center at Pinedale, which is desperately in need of an ultra sound. The prime purpose of this activity was: 1. Thank the centers on behalf of the Knights of Columbus for their commitment to life. 2. Open a dialogue with the centers on the subject as to how the Knights can support and sustain these centers and their pro- life activities.
- At the request of Ken Stockwell we are responding to our Wyoming Bishop's request to validate
 the value of the Ultra Sound Initiative by obtaining statistics from each center. We can validate
 a success rate of the centers at about 85% of the pregnant clients who enter the center choose
 life for their babies. The per cent of those pregnant and abortion-minded who enter the
 pregnancy center and ultimately choose life for their babies ranges from 79 to 100% in all 9
 Centers. (Please note individual stats on separate sheet)
- We now have 3 councils starting the process of adding an Ultra Sound to a Pregnancy Center.
- We have set up an educational table on 2 separate occasions. The table theme is Ultra-Sound.
- To indicate Wyoming Knights of Columbus presence, we attended three annual fund raisers which each supported a local Pregnancy Center.
- Communications have begun with pro-life Wyoming legislators to initiate an Ultra Sound Bill for the 2016 legislature.
- We have attended, on behalf of the Wyoming Knights of Columbus, two sessions of 40 Days Prayer for life in front of the Planned Parenthood facility, Fort Collins Co.
- In January, 2015 Wyoming March for Life, Wyoming Council 4th Degree Knights and many Knights, friends and families were wonderfully represented in the Annual March for Life. Hats off to Wyoming Knights for your participation.
- The Wyoming Council participated in supporting the Pro- Life booth at the Wyoming State Fair.
 Knights donated three days in the fair booth.

Goshen County Right and Laramie County Right to Life are ecumenical groups in which we participate and support. We feel strongly that all who support life issues must co-ordinate efforts for our desired result: saving all life!

CLOSING

Completing this mission and accomplishing our goals was an unbelievable experience. The mission, accomplishments and commitment to the life issues was confirmed in each center we visited. It also created awareness that without these centers the Knights' message of pro life would be very different. The best way we can communicate the need for these centers is to reiterate our beliefs that these centers are the defense against Planned Parenthood.

All Wyoming Knights' Counsels need to include active involvement in supporting a Pregnancy Center in Wyoming.

Included is a suggested activity for the Wyoming State Council Officers to consider which will address this issue of Council support.

Another successful year has come and gone. Our council had several fun events. The action started with the fifth annual "Harvest Dinner" that was held in November of this year and included a live auction of home baked goods. This event generated over \$1,000.00 to our charity fund. Over one hundred people attended and enjoyed the fellowship and good food.

One of our consistent events is the "Second Sunday" breakfast that is also a great charity generator for our council. Our council has four teams that rotate cooking and serving breakfast on the second Sunday of each month. Good food and fellowship is also a product of this tradition.

Every spring, our council hosted a free throw contest. This event has shown to be our fastest growing function. In years past the average participating count was nine kids. This year we had forty young participants. Our new Chairman for this event did a wonderful job capitalizing on creative advertising and exposure. We even had some of our local kids qualify for state.

Our Council also sponsors a scholarship program that thus far is assisting in the education of our youth population here at St. Barb's church.

One of our newest events is the "Powell Pony Race" the Knights developed two years ago. This is an event that offers food, fellowship and an interactive pony race for all ages. This year will be our third year hosting this event and it proved to show growth and potential. We usually raise about three thousand dollars and enjoy a full day of fun and excitement. This year we are working with a local farm and ranch store that is owned by a fellow Knight and expect it to be a fun event. The pony racers aged from two to twelve years in age. We view this breakfasts as our effort towards the "Building of the Domestic Church" as they have provided a venue for fellowship among St John the Baptist Church Parishioners.

Our Past Grand Knights dinner was held in November with leg of lamb as the main dish prepared by one of our Brother Knights. It was the best attended dinner in quite some time. We were glad to have attend this dinner our new District Deputy Mike Fulton. Grand Knight Blaine reported on the results of a study he is doing looking at timing and amount of precipitation and resultant rangeland forage production.

In December we held an Advent Social for Brother Knights and their spouses or significant other. The Social was well attended an indication it was a mistake to not have had it the year before.

In November the Parish had a spaghetti feed in which the Knights set up the tables and chairs in the Parish Hall for. While we were doing this a Mr. Victor Hannuneh arrived to set up his display of olive wood Christian carvings and asked if the Knights would be willing to purchase an item to raffle off as a fund raiser. We decided to do so and purchased a very nice Crèche for \$479. We sold \$903 in raffle tickets for this and drew the winning ticket at the Parish's Advent Dinner in December. Due to the success of this raffle we will probably do it again this coming year if Mr. Hannuneh returns to our Parish to sell olive wood carvings prior to Advent.

Our annual fish fry and main fund raiser was held on Shrove Tuesday. We served about 600 people this year which was better than the last few years. Due to a structural problem with the Parish Hall we had to move the fish fry to the Community Building on the County Fairgrounds. Although this was a bit of an inconvenience as we had to haul our cooking and serving utensils from the hall to this building it turned out to be a blessing in disguise. The Community Building is larger than our Parish Hall and thus can accommodate more people. This resulted in folks staying longer to visit as they did not feel they had to leave to make room for others and enjoyed the event even more so. We are seriously considering to have the fish fry at this site in the future.

One of the main beneficiaries from the funds received from our fish fry is at least one Catholic High School Graduating Senior as we award a \$1000 scholarship. We again awarded two scholarships as we had sufficient funds to do so; \$1000 to one applicant and \$500 to another applicant.

In mid-March we held our Free throw contest for youth 9-14 at the Middle School gym. There were 14 boys and three girls that competed. All participants received a participation certificate and the winners of each boys' and girls' age group received a Champion certificate and a plague with their name engraved on it. This was the first year in many that we gave out plagues and they were well received by the youth. Two of the boys' champions were able to attend the State competition in Casper and came away as Champions of that event.

We donated \$50 to the Knights of Columbus Charities for Christian refugees in the Middle East.

We donated \$100 to the local YMCA to assist with their maintenance fund.

We donated \$200 to the Diocese seminarian fund.

We donated \$50 to the Cooper Schroefel fund. These funds are to help his family offset the medical costs for Cooper. Cooper has a rare brain disorder that has required multiple surgeries.

Grand Knight Blaine completed the three online training modules offered by Praesidium's *Armatus* to satisfy the Order's Safe Environment Program.

Council #3332 will continue to provide man power for setting up tables and chairs for funerals, dinners and other activities at St John the Baptist and continue to strive to do our best for our Parish and Priest, and our Community. In addition, Council members have contributed nearly 60 hours in community service to our local American Legion. This will continue into the New Year as well.

We are staying busy with our recruiting of members and supporting our church activities, such as our choir singing and the giving out of roses on Mother's Day.



Kicked off Advent with a blessing of the Nativity Scene and coffee/hot chocolate/cupcakes and donuts afterward.

Lit Luminaries along the Church property and around the Nativity Scene before each Advent Evening Mass as a reminder of the Advent Preparation season.

Donated \$5000 for the repair of the Church roof.

Our community activities included:

Cook-outs, breakfasts and dinners. We participate each year in the Flaming Gorge Days and Riverfest activities in Green River, cooking a variety of meals from burgers and brats to spaghetti. During Lent we cook our Friday evening Fish Fry and on Sunday mornings, our Lenten Breakfasts. We cook burgers and hot dogs for the Parish Picnic.

Our Council donated our food and cooking skill in support of the 1st Annual Immaculate Conception Summer Festival. This event raised over \$2000 for the Parish capital improvement fund. These activities highlight our presence in the community and we have been told how people look forward to our cook-outs.

We boiled and colored over 70 dozen Easter Eggs and filled over 36 dozen plastic eggs in our Annual Easter Egg Hunt. We had over 100 kids from ages 0 to 12 years of age – who in less than 15 minutes scoured the Church property collecting the eggs. Quite a show!

Our council participates in the Highway Clean-up campaign and dedicated over 13 hours cleaning the interstate coming into Green River.

Our community charities included:

Food for the Poor collection – we donated over 570 lbs. of food to the Loaves and Fishes Soup Kitchen.

Coats for Kids – we donated over 60 coats to local kids in need.

Elementary School Backpack Program – we donated over \$250 in food for the local elementary school program.

We donated \$1500 to the Aaron Palm High School Senior scholarship program.

Special Olympics – we donated \$100 to the Special Olympics.

Military Chaplin's Fund – we donated \$100 to the Military Chaplin's fund.

Stop Persecution of Christians in Ukraine and Iran – donated \$200.

Living and Giving in Christ – Donated \$500.

Priest's Retirement Fund – We sold our remaining "7 Wonders of Wyoming" coffee table books with those donations going to the Priest's Retirement Fund. We sold more books than the Rock Spring's Chamber of Commerce and now must have the books delivered to our church instead. We advertise the Gun-A-Week Raffle in our KofC weekly newsletter and have seen good Parishioner participation.

RE: The Grand Knights Report to the State Convention

Though small, the Saratoga Snowy Range Chapter of the Knights of Columbus continues to be an integral part of the Platte Valley community. Unfortunately, our efforts to recruit new members has not produced any results this year, but we are still able to provide assistance to St. Ann's church and the valley community.

Knights of the Snowy Range Council are active lectors, Eucharistic ministers, ushers, and server mentors. They help teach CCD and serve on the parish council. For our communities, they organize and promote blood drives, help with the community pantry, support the museums and advertise for pro-life and keeping Christ in Christmas.

As Knights we secure and store game meat for the Platte Valley Pantry. This year we distributed about 1000 pounds of processed and wrapped meat to people in need. Hunters and outfitters paid for all of the processing, while our job was to request, secure and deliver the wild game to the community pantry. Three knights participated in this effort again this year, providing a valuable service to those in need in our community.

Our major church activities included supporting a seminarian and providing help for our priest, Father Joey Beaucamino. Our cost for these projects was over \$1100.

We have made an ongoing commitment to a Wound Warriors Project by supporting the Trout Unlimited effort to provide a superior outing for Wyoming Warriors to enjoy the Platte River Valley --fishing and feasting. Our donation is \$500.

To fund our charitable projects and council activities, we rely heavily on profits from recycling aluminum cans. Using a heavy-duty crusher, we smashed over 4000 pounds of cans that Platte Valley neighbors place in our collections trailers, making \$3334. The work-nights involve a couple of hours of labor and a couple hours of eating and socializing. Usually there are between 4 and 8 Knights who show up for these events.

Our family activity is the annual parish picnic. Five knights set up the park for Mass, cooked and served a picnic meal for the sixty or so parishioners in attendance. Our cost was \$395.

The annual St. Patrick's Day dinner is a highly anticipated social event for the Valley and Brother Knights pitch-in to make it a memorable time. We use this event to gather as Brothers, starting with breakfast and leisurely cook and socialize together all day. Ten knights helped with the preparation, serving and clean-up. We served 130 dinners and made \$300 at the event. Our goal is not fund raising but community spirit.

Priests in the State of Wyoming look forward to the Annual "St. Malachi Open". Our late-Brother Tom O'Leary established provisions for this event to continue for at least the next year. The priests gather for the tournament at the Old Baldy Club Golf course and afterwards we barbeque steaks for them at St. Ann's. Five knights helped serve the twelve grateful priests.

Father Jaime Bueno and the parish council of St. Helen's church thought it would be nice if there were a location that the members of St. Helen's Parish and the rest of the communities in Bridger Valley could use for social gatherings, picnics, cook outs, etc.

The Bindl Council 10027 proceeded to make this happen. The council members got together and came up with ideas for location, name, design and costs. Father Jaime and the parish council decided that the location would be behind the church. The Councils design was accepted. Father Jaime wanted the name of the location to be called "St. Helen's Family Pavilion". Cost would run around \$7,000.00.

Everything started out great when one of our previous Knights (Dan Rinker) who now lives in Morristown, Arizona, donated \$5000.00 for the construction of the pavilion in memory of his late wife (Betty Rinker). That left about \$2,000.00 to raise for the completion of the project. The Knights and parishioners of St. Helen's came up with the remaining monies.

A contractor was enlisted to do the actual construction. The pavilion was built starting with a 20'x30' cement slab. 6"x6" posts were installed on the corners and middle of the long side of the pavilion. To those posts, a gable metal roof was installed to cover the pavilion. Diagonal corners of the pavilion were studded and sided with metal siding for support and protection from the wind and weather. These corners were where the food could be placed, heated and prepared.

The Knights purchased and picked up ten (10) all weather picnic tables from Salt Lake City for seating along with two (2) gas barbecues for cooking.

Knights of Columbus members installed electricity to the pavilion from the church's main electrical panel. They then proceeded to wire the pavilion with lights and outlets.

The pavilion was such a success that we are considering pouring more concrete to increase the eating area and making it more accessible for the handicap.

Father Jaime is no longer with us in Fort Bridger, but our new priest Father Tim Martinson will really enjoy the pavilion.

July 15, 2014 was only one date of this ongoing project. Three months before, Council 2578 faced loosing their charter. The Grand Knight was moving to take on a new career, the financial secretary had served two terms and was ready to "retire", and no other third degree knight was willing to step forward to take charge. Then, by chance, 2578's chaplain Father Hugh Blotsky, happened to mention to Supreme Council member Ken Stockwell of Cody Wyoming that 2578 was preparing to fold. Once Ken found out what the situation was there was no turning back. The phone calls and emails came on a regular basis. A meeting was set with the chaplain, Ken, financial secretary and council member Dan Fahrenkrug. Instead of advising us how to disband, Ken advised on how to grow. The wheels were set in motion and there was plenty of grease. Instead of folding, council 2578 was destined to reach a membership level it hadn't seen in 10 years. Meetings with Father Blotsky, letters to prospective members and family members to a council picnic, and phone calls by Dan. Dan volunteered to be Grand Knight for a year and was voted in. The financial secretary agreed to stay on as financial secretary and was successfully reappointed. With a Grand Knight and Financial Secretary, plus Ken's help, the council took on new life. On July 15 council 2578 hosted a 1st degree ceremony with Degree Team Council 4031 conducting the degree ceremony. Six new members with three for 2578 were inducted. The momentum continued with 2578 conducting two additional 1st Degree Ceremonies by DVD. 2578 then sponsored a 2nd and 3rd Degree Ceremony in November and two of the new members became 3rd Degree. Throughout this time into January 2015 another five members joined 2578 through transfer. In seven months the council grew from 23 members to 33. 2578 sponsored two pancake breakfasts as fund-raisers and was able to donate funds to Hot Springs County Special Olympics. Christmas gifts for Mass servers, and repair of the 10 Commandments monument lettering. Monthly meetings are well attended. 2578,s February

meeting involved an open meeting with family complete with a pie social.

The moral of our story is: There is help available. You don't have to do everything by yourself. Chaplains, Supreme, State, neighboring councils are there to help you. You need only ask. Oh, and don't forget prayer.

This project was initiated to bring more attention to the pro life ideal that is sorely lacking throughout our communities. Fortunately, Cheyenne does not have an abortionist, but we felt the need to support the 40 Days For Life campaign in Ft. Collins Colorado by committing time on Friday afternoons to stand on the sidewalk in front of the abortion business, Planned Parenthood, with time in silent prayer or holding signs supporting the right to life. 40 Days For Life event takes place 40 days during both Advent and Lent and has grown considerably throughout the country and has even become international. Fridays and Saturdays are the abortion days at the Planned Parenthood business and the Knights of Columbus in Cheyenne chose to participate on Friday afternoons because fewer people are able to commit to Fridays than Saturdays when many more people have time off of work.

The mission is, in our view, paramount to most other events as support to the fundamental right to life is in itself the basis and dignity that determines our best virtues. Without this dignity as the basis for our conduct, every other action, decision or virtue in our lives is negotiable.

The Knights have taken the courage to stand in front of the public often ridiculed or subject to profanity by those individuals that believe women have the right to murder the innocent babies. This action by the Knights also provokes support and encouragement from those people who believe in the right to life, but are afraid to take a stand. These actions, though small, are critically important in planting the seeds that can shift the hearts and minds of people to realize the truth that babies inside or outside of the womb are humans and should enjoy the rights endowed by our Creator as with the person-hood of any other individual.

While the spiritual battle is very real in this setting, prayers and convictions of the Knights who participate are making a difference. We have been told that the Planned Parenthood abortion business is reduced as much as 70% with no show appointments when people are on the sidewalk attending these prayer vigils. While we don't know specifically how many babies have been saved from the abortionist, we know that many have been saved because the parents tell the participates they have changed their minds about having an abortion and keep the baby because they see people standing on the sidewalks in defense of life. Planned Parenthood knows our actions work.

Brother Knight, Joe Beaudrie's son, Danny (a Cody High School freshman), and three other members of his wrestling team along with his coach and coach's daughter were involved in a horrific automobile accident in the Wind River canyon south of Thermopolis when a large boulder fell on top of their vehicle at approximately 10 pm at night while they were traveling just north of the tunnels. The team and coach had been returning from a national wrestling tournament in Colorado. Some members were taken to the hospital in Thermopolis, the coach and daughter were life flighted to Denver and Danny was life flighted to Billings. Danny suffered severe facial trauma including a severe concussion, being scalped, breaking both eye sockets, and also suffered a fractured neck and spine. The initial surgery was successful but it still required him to be in an ICU hospital room for a week and a half before being released to go home on Holy Thursday. Grand Knight Sitz immediately started the prayer chain for Danny and his team mates as well as notified the parish. That following Sunday the Knights held a fundraising breakfast to garner funds to aid the family including the \$43,500 life flight bill, and to help defray the medical expenses for a week and a half stay in ICU. We invited the whole parish to attend a lenten breakfast after Sunday morning mass on Palm Sunday and under the leadership of veteran chef Bill McCormick we served 150-200 people a delightful breakfast that morning. The council netted over \$1900 to help the Beaudrie family with their expenses which is incredible considering a normal lenten breakfast traditionally nets only \$200.

With the help of a lot of prayers, family support, and a great medical staff, Danny is currently doing well but he still has a long road to recovery including daily therapy and continued doctor visits. As a freshman Danny was on the Cody State champion football team, placed 3rd at the State wrestling competition this year in Casper, and had also placed third at the national wrestling tournament that he was returning from that horrific weekend. He is a faithful and very devout young man, and although this has set him back it has further strengthened his faith and undoubtedly strengthened his will to return to the athletic field that he loves so much.



John and Maggie's Story

Margaret, "Maggie" Cosner was born in Hays, Kansas in 1956, 2nd oldest of nine children. She attended catholic schools 1st grade through high school. Maggie's father suddenly passed away after her high school graduation and it wasn't long before her family became a "Yours, Mine and Ours" when her mother married a man with 11 children and her half sister was born a year later. The uniqueness of having two large families join together came with many challenges and most certainly had a major impact on her life. Maggie's Catholic faith has always been a huge part of her life and she has said that it was a guiding light for her as she traveled to Wyoming upon graduating with her master's degree in the area of special education, specializing in working with emotionally disturbed children.

On January 1st 1958 John was born, the youngest of four boys. His Mom and Dad didn't quite make it to the hospital from their ranch south of Wright and as a result, he was delivered by his dad on the side of the road. John's parents were both deaf since before they were two years of age, and although that presented some interesting challenges, it also created many opportunities for John and his brother's to be the ears for their parents. John would not only interpret for his parents but also for other deaf individuals who needed some help communicating. The love, care and respect that John showed to his parents has always been a most endearing quality.

Growing up with deaf parents was one of the reasons church attendance was not a part of John's formative years. Upon meeting Maggie, however, the allure of the catholic faith began for John. Her love of her faith and the important role it took in her life was something that John wanted to learn more about. After a brief engagement, we were married in 1984 at St. Matthew's Church. In 1985, John joined the church and together we have been active in a variety of ministries over the years in all the communities in which we have lived. The desire to participate fully in the Catholic faith became like a growing seed that we nurtured together and it continues to blossom in our lives as we continue to learn and grow in our faith. In 1992 we were blessed with a daughter, Anna, who is currently attending the University of Wyoming studying accounting. She attends the Newman Center and participates in activities when she can.

John's parents were influenced greatly by his decision to join the Catholic Church and both his parents eventually joined prior to their deaths. Many people would often comment how beautiful it was to see him signing for his Mom at church on Sunday's in the last few years of her life. Maggie had learned to sign as well over the years and would attend weekly Mass at Pioneer Manor with Iola signing for her and helping her learn about the Catholic Church. After Iola had passed away, Maggie began attending the children's mass and has taught some sign language for

several responses to the students at St. John Paul II. The students continue to sign and can sometimes be seen signing to these responses at mass on Sundays.

Having worked in the area of banking for over thirty years, John is currently employed by First National Bank. In addition to working in the world of banking, John has always been active in his community believing in the importance of volunteering beginning with the Gillette Jaycees, Campbell County 4-H program, Knights of Columbus, St. Matthew's Parish and Gillette Main Street Organization in addition to many different boards he has served on over the years.

Maggie is retired and claims to be busier than ever. Over her 30 years in the field of education, she has taught all grades Kindergarten thru college and prior to retiring in 2008, worked as an elementary principal for 18 years. She often described her job as a vocation, going far beyond just teaching, but truly creating a caring environment wherever she was employed modeling the morals and Christian values she was raised with. Over the years, she has served on a variety of boards such as the Y.E.S. House, the Children's Center, Healthcare Foundation Board, the School Planning Committee for St. John Paul II School, the Parish Council and the Leadership Team. She has been able to spend more time quilting and some of her work can be found in the Adoration Chapel at the Family Life Center and in the children's Sunday school room at St. Matthew's Church. She has been more active in the CCW organization and has just accepted the role of representing our Parish on the Deanery Board.

Ceremonials: Jim has expressed an interest in becoming the Warden on our 2nd Degree Team and is currently in training for this role.


Bingo Crew Member: As Jim puts it he is a proud member of the second Sunday Bingo crew helping raise funds to support Council activities.

The People for People Backpack Program is designed to feed our School Children. Our Goal is to Stop

Hunger, Create better test scores, generate positive behavior, improve health and increase attendance.

We are sending out approximately 150 bags of food every week. We are providing meals for all grades

from Kindergarten to grade 12.

We are finding that it takes about \$100.00 dollars per student per year. Totaling \$15,000 dollars for the

school year. We are providing meals for all grades from Kindergarten to grade 12.

With your support you have helped us succeed feeding our children on the weekends here in

Thermopolis this year. Our Community has been very generous donating financially, donating food and

volunteering their time.

The Knights of Columbus Traveling Door

This is the story of the beginning of the K of C Traveling Door, as written by George Burns, PSD. The history of the Traveling Door begins in 1960. My wife and I attended the K of C State Convention, in Laramie that year. We attended the Sat. evening banquet and dance that followed. We were told there would be a door prize awarded to some lucky winner at mid-night. We were all given a lucky ticket for the drawing. We danced visited with the other Knights and their wives. We had a good time.

At midnight the drawing was held. I don't remember if Ann's ticket or mine was the winner. They brought the door prize out to us. It was a door, how appropriate. We loaded it in the back of our station wagon, and took it home the next day.

We had a door, but didn't need a door in our home in Dubois.

Over the next several days, maybe a week, we talked about what to do with the door. Finally one evening, at the supper table, one of us suggested that we take the door to Riverton, to the next Council meeting, and ask them if e could make this a Traveling Trophy for the K of C's. The suggestion was accepted whole heartedly, and the Traveling Door Trophy was born.

We decided, that since the door came from Laramie, we would make the Laramie Council # 2720, the first Council on the door.

We had the door in our possession so we kept it, as we were to host the State Convention the following year, 1961. When we approached the end of the Convention, we brought the Door to the front of the room, called Casper Council # 1563, to the front, presented them with the Door, and then told the delegates the where, how, and why, of the Traveling Door. It must have been accepted, as the Traveling Door has been traveling around the great State of Wyoming ever since.

I guess a correction should be made here, as there were a few years when the Door was retired, but that took the fun and stories about the Door, out of the proceedings, and the Traveling Door was soon back in action.

I'm hoping the Traveling Door continues to be passed around the State for another 50 years. I'm also hoping this story becomes a part of the History and Tradition of the Wyoming State Council, of the Knights of Columbus.

Resolution to Change By-Laws approved by Supreme Board 13 day of December 2012

WHEREAS, Article III, Officers, Section 1 reads:

<u>Section 1</u>. The State Deputy, State Chaplain, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate, and the State Warden shall hold the same relative position in the State Council that the corresponding Officers hold in the Supreme Council, and

WHEREAS, there is no Article III, Officers, Section 9, add Section 9,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Article III, Officers, Section 1 reads: Section 1. The State Deputy, State Chaplain, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate, and the State Warden shall hold the same relative position in the State Council that the corresponding Officers hold in the Supreme Council. The State Executive Secretary shall be appointed by the State Officers and shall have no voting rights at State Meetings.

FURTHER RESOLVED, that Article III, Officers, Section 9 reads:

<u>Section 9.</u> State Executive Secretary shall be appointed by the State Officers, for a period of 3 to 5 years. The State Executive Secretary shall be the State's Audit Advisor and work with the State Treasurer to insure all documents are provided to the States Auditing Firm to perform the state's financial audit and file the State's Tax Return 990-EZ. Shall be the main contact of the State Council for the IRS. Shall be the Tax Advisor and work

with all subordinate councils and assemblies in the State and advise them of filing 990-EZ's or 990-N's and receive copies of all subordinate councils 990-EZ's and 990-N's. An allowance of \$75.00 per year shall be made to the State Executive Secretary to defray the incidental expenses of his office.

WYOMING STATE COUNCIL KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS BY-LAWS



ARTICLE I Eligibility

<u>Section 1</u>. Membership: Officers and Eligibility in the State Council shall be all duly elected and qualified State Officers, the State Chaplain, the last Past State Deputy, District Deputies and delegates or their alternatives. The terms, "last Past State Deputy" and "delegates", are as defined in Chapter II of the Charter, Constitution, and Laws of the Order.

<u>Section 2</u>. Past State Deputies (other than the last Past State Deputy living in the State) and District Deputies shall be members of the State Council and shall have the privilege of the floor but without the right to vote.

ARTICLE II State Convention

<u>Section 1</u>. The State Council shall be convened annually between the first day of April to and including the first day of June in each year by the State Deputy at such place within the State as shall be determined at the State Council meeting three years preceding the State Council meeting, provided that the State Officers shall select such place of meeting if so directed by the State Council or in the case said Council shall fail to do so or whenever it becomes impractical to hold meeting at the place designated by the State Council.

<u>Section 2</u>. The State Secretary shall furnish credential blanks to the Financial Secretary of each subordinate council at least sixty (60) days before the annual meeting of the State Council.

<u>Section 3</u>. The Financial Secretary of each council shall prepare and certify credentials in duplicate signed by the Grand Knight and Financial Secretary under seal for the delegates and alternates; forward one copy to the State Secretary at least ten (10) days before the annual meeting of the State Council and deliver the other copy to the delegates or alternates who shall present same at said meeting.

<u>Section 4</u>. The State Secretary shall notify all Councils in the State sixty (60) days prior to the State Convention of the time, place and date of said convention.

- <u>Section 5</u>. The State Secretary shall prepare a roll of all delegates and alternates on the credentials received as provided in Section 3, and said roll shall be the roll of the State Council until changed by said council.
- Section 6. Councils not having paid duly levied assessments by the State Council

 not have the names of their delegates or alternates placed on the temporary or permanent roll of the State Council until such assessments have been paid.
- <u>Section 7.</u> Councils who elected to participate in the liability insurance program and not having paid duly levied assessments by the State Council for the Insurance shall not have the names of their delegates or alternates placed on the temporary or permanent roll of the State Council until such insurance assessments have been paid.
- <u>Section 8</u>. A majority of the eligible voters of the State Council shall constitute a quorum. Majority vote shall govern all matters. Eligible voters shall consist of all State Officers, the State Chaplain, last living Past State Deputy and Delegates or their alternates from each council.
- <u>Section 9</u>. All meetings of the State Council shall be in the third section. All duly qualified third degree members shall be admitted as spectators.
- <u>Section 10</u>. The order of business shall be as specified in the constitution and laws of the Order.
- <u>Section 11</u>. Each Council is entitled to two votes. In the event only one delegate is present, he shall be entitled to cast the two votes for his council.
- <u>Section 12</u>. In the absence or inability of the State Deputy, the State Secretary shall execute all the duties of the State Deputy. In the absence of the State Deputy and the State Secretary the obligation of executing the duties of the State Deputy shall devolve on the other State Officers in the following order: State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden.

ARTICLE III Officers

<u>Section 1</u>. The State Deputy, State Chaplain, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and the State Warden shall hold the same relative position in the State Council that the corresponding Officers hold in the Supreme Council. The State Executive Secretary shall be appointed by the State Officers and shall have no voting rights at State Meetings.

<u>Section 2</u>. The State Deputy shall be the Chief Executive of the Order in the State, and he shall be recognized as the representative of the Supreme Knight and Board of Directors. He shall possess all powers and perform such duties as the laws of the order prescribe. He shall preside at all meetings of the State Council and shall be ex-officio member of all committees. He shall appoint District Deputies and Program Directors for such Districts and Programs. The State Deputy shall make a written report to the State Council on the state of condition of the Order within the jurisdiction of Wyoming. He is also required to make reports to the Supreme Knight and Board of Directors from time to time as required. The State Deputy shall possess such other powers and perform such other duties as the laws of the Order prescribe. The State Deputy shall supervise the exemplification of the Knighthood (3rd) degree.

<u>Section 3</u>. State Secretary shall act as Recorder of all meetings of the State Council; bill and collect all money due to the State Council, make a record thereof and promptly transmit the same to the State Treasurer; draw orders on the State Treasurer for all payments authorized by the State Council; keep a debit and credit account with each subordinate council and a full account with the State Treasurer; keep a record of the membership in the State; and make a report to the State Council of the membership and finances of the Order in the State for the year ending March 31st, in such form as the State Council may direct. Said report shall be furnished to the State Officers and each subordinate council along with the proceedings of the State Council meeting within 60 days after adjournment. An allowance of \$75.00 per year shall be made to the State Secretary to defray the incidental expenses of his office.

<u>Section 4</u>. State Treasurer shall keep a true and accurate account of all money received and disbursed; deposit all money received to the account of the Wyoming State Council, Knights of Columbus; an allowance of \$75.00 per year shall be made to the State Treasurer. He shall be ex-officio member and treasurer of every committee of the State Council. He shall give a report of the financial condition of the State Council for the year ending March 31st, in such form as the State Council may prescribe.

<u>Section 5</u>. State Advocate shall be Attorney of the Council in case of trial and investigation of any matter whatsoever of the State Council. The State Advocate is obligated to advise the State Council in all matters legally binding on the State Council.

<u>Section 6</u>. State Warden shall be present at all meetings of the State Council and at the opening take up the Third Degree Traveling Cards and admit none but duly qualified third degree members. He shall perform duties as may be designated to him by the State Deputy.

<u>Section 7</u>. State Chaplain shall be appointed by the State Officers. He shall conduct all religious exercises of the State Council. In the event of his absence the State Deputy may appoint a substitute for him. He shall be allowed Seventy Five and No/100 Dollars (\$75.00) per year to defray expenses for such duties.

<u>Section 8</u>. The State Secretary and the State Treasurer shall be bonded in the sum of Twenty Thousand and No/100 Dollars (\$20,000.00) each, and that the State Secretary shall request the Supreme Secretary to have such bonding covered under the blanket bond of the Supreme Council. Upon receipt of request for that purpose, the Supreme Secretary will make the necessary entry on his records and notify the bonding company, and he will then bill our State Council accordingly. This bonding is on the office, not the person.

<u>Section 9.</u> The State Executive Secretary shall be appointed by the State Officers, for a period of 3 to 5 years. The State Executive Secretary shall be the State's Audit Advisor and work with the State Treasurer to insure all documents are provided to the States Auditing Firm to perform the state's financial audit and file the State's Tax Return 990-EZ. Shall be the main contact of the State Council for the IRS. Shall be the Tax Advisor and work with all subordinate councils and assemblies in the State and advise them of filing 990-EZ's or 990-N's and receive copies of all subordinate councils 990-EZ's and 990-N's. An allowance of \$75.00 per year shall be made to the State Executive Secretary to defray the incidental expenses of his office.

ARTICLE IV Committees

<u>Section 1</u>. All committees shall be appointed by the State Deputy or other presiding officer. If expense is incurred by any committee member which would not be covered through any other course, an itemized statement signed by said member should be presented to the State Deputy for approval and if so approved, the State Secretary may draw an order of the State Treasurer for payment of such expense in the same manner as is required for other expenditures.

<u>Section 2</u>. All subordinate council resolutions shall be in writing and submitted to the State Advocate 30 days prior to the convening of the convention. A copy of the resolution shall be submitted to each voting delegate in attendance at the Convention. Convention reports shall be in writing and submitted to the State Secretary at the Convention.

<u>Section 3</u>. To define resolutions and amendments: Resolutions bind the State Council for the forthcoming year only. New by-laws or amendments to existing by-laws shall be presented as such.

ARTICLE V Finances

<u>Section 1</u>. The Budget Committee shall ascertain the amount required for the expense of the ensuing year and recommend such measures of finances as they deem necessary.

<u>Section 2</u>. All funds of the State Council shall be paid to the State Secretary by draft, money order or check, payable to the order of the Wyoming State Council and shall be deposited to the credit of the State Council in a bank or banks approved by the State Council.

<u>Section 3</u>. Payment of State Council funds for authorized expenditures shall be made by the check of the State Treasurer upon receipt of approved expense voucher signed by the State Deputy and State Secretary.

<u>Section 4</u>. Officers of the State Council are hereby authorized to expend such money as is necessary for the usual and ordinary conduct of the business of their respective offices. Items of an extraordinary nature and all items involving expenditures of Three Hundred and No/100 Dollars (\$300.00) or over shall require advance authorization or the approval of the State Council Officers before payment, and shall be paid by the State Treasurer as provided.

<u>Section 5</u>. For the purpose of defraying the expenses and obligations of the State Council, there shall be levied against and collected from all the subordinate councils semi-annually a per-capita assessment based on the number of members of the respective councils, as of the first day of January and July of the current year, as shown by the records of the Supreme Secretary. The State Secretary shall obtain from the Supreme Secretary and present to the State Council Meeting a certificate showing the number of members of each council, as of said date. The amount of such per-capita assessment shall be such as the State Council meeting shall determine. Honorary members are to include the Supreme per capita charges, the Catholic Advertising assessment, and the amount of the annual state council per capita charge. Members of the clergy, Honorary Life, and disabled members shall be exempt from per-capita assessment. The State Council shall make a rebate to college councils of 50% of the annual per capita tax assessed against and paid by the membership of said councils, and said councils shall use said funds for those Catholic and fraternal programs as shall be approved by the Council Chaplain.

Section 6. Allowance for attendance. State Officers, Past State Deputies, Former State Chaplains, District Deputies, and State Committee Chairman in attendance at the State Council meeting shall be allowed mileage each way between their council's location and the place of the State meeting and per diem for attendance at the meeting of the State Council. The Delegates attending the State Council meeting will be paid per diem for attendance at the meeting of the State Council. The Knights of Columbus State Convention is a two day event commencing at approximately 1:00 p.m. on Friday and ending at approximately 1:00 p.m. on Sunday. Per diem is paid on the basis of a twenty four (24) hour day. No part of any day less than one-half (12 hours) will be paid. (Refer to Article V, Section 8 for mileage and per diem determination.)

<u>Section 7</u>. State Deputy approved Registration Fees for the State Officers, the State Chaplain, District Deputies, State Committee Chairman and the last living Past State Deputy shall be paid by the State Council.

<u>Section 8</u>. Definition – There are six (6) categories: 1 – State Officers, 2 – Past State Deputies, 3 – Former State Chaplains, 4 – District Deputies, 5 – State Committee Chairmen and 6 – Delegates in attendance at the State Council meetings. The first five (5) categories will have mileage and per diem determined. The last category six (6) (Delegates) will have only per diem determined. The rate of payment for per diem as well as mileage is to be determined by the Mileage and Per Diem Committee and approved by majority vote of the State Council.

ARTICLE VI Elections

<u>Section 1.</u> Election of State Officers and delegates to the Supreme Convention shall be consistent with the Constitution, Laws and Rules of the Order.

Section 2. Order of Election.

- (a) The nomination of candidates for and the election of the State Deputy shall first be held, and the results declared.
- (b) The other State Officers in order shall then be nominated and the results declared.
- (c) Then shall follow the nomination and election of representatives to the Supreme Convention, which shall be nominated at once and elected on the same ballot. As many of those receiving the highest vote and who belong to the insurance class as there are insurance delegates to be elected shall represent the class. As many other candidates who receive the highest vote, whether associate or

insurance, as may be required to fill the delegation shall represent the associate class.

ARTICLE VII Raffles and Lotteries

<u>Section 1</u>. All raffles and lotteries conducted by subordinate councils must be authorized under state law and the law of the Order.

<u>Section 2</u>. All requests by subordinate councils must be in writing to the State Deputy or a person designated by him. All requests must show that all net proceeds will be distributed to a designated charity. All deposits of money must be to an account designated for charity. All tickets for such raffles and lotteries must be sold in Wyoming.

Article VIII Insurance

<u>Section 1</u>. Subordinate councils shall be able to buy liability insurance for their individual councils needs. This insurance will be voluntary and based upon the membership of the council. The State Secretary will bill the councils desiring the insurance based on the current rate for the year as quoted by the Insurance Company per member based upon their present membership number as of June 1. This insurance will cover what the diocese requires for us to have for our events and programs that are held upon church property.

Article IX Supreme Convention

<u>Section 1.</u> <u>State Chaplain</u>: The State Chaplain's expenses to attend the Supreme Convention will be paid by the State Council at the same per diem and mileage rate as the State Deputy. The mileage will be figured from the State Chaplain's place of residence to the location of the Supreme Convention. If the State Chaplain receives per diem from Supreme, then the State Council will pay only mileage.

Article X Miscellaneous

<u>Section 1</u>. Subordinate Councils shall furnish membership and other reports requested by the State Officers within a period not exceeding thirty (30) days from the date of such request, unless a shorter period is specified in the request, in which case the information will be furnished within the required time.

<u>Section 2</u>. The Wyoming State Council has established a trust known as "Wyoming Knights of Columbus Charitable Trust." The purpose of this trust is to provide a perpetual fund to help defray the costs of educating seminarians and providing for priests' retirement. The State Treasurer is a trustee of this Trust or, if he cannot serve, a member of the State Council appointed by the State Deputy will act as a trustee.

<u>Section 3</u>. The Wyoming State council has established the Change From Heaven as a way to collect money for the Charitable Trust and Fr. McGivney Burse for seminarians. The councils are asked to collect change during the year and present it at a roll call of the councils present at the convention. The money will be split equally between the Chartable Trust and the Fr McGivney Burse.

<u>Section 4</u>. These By-laws, or any part thereof, may be amended or repealed at any regular meeting of the State Council by a majority of those present, subject to approval by the Supreme Council.
